The purpose of the proposed action is to establish appropriate and necessary permitting requirements for discharge of wastewater from Non-metallic Mineral Mining. The proposed regulation will set forth standard language for effluent limitations and monitoring requirements necessary to regulate this category of dischargers. The existing general permit expires on June 30, 2009. The general permit is being reissued in order to continue making it available for Non-metallic Mineral Mining operations after that date. This is a reissuance of an existing regulation, and there are changes to the regulation.
