Purpose

The proposed action repeals existing regulations (22 VAC 45-50) concurrently with the promulgation of new regulations (22 VAC 45-51.) The current regulations, last revised in 1990, are outdated. 22 VAC 45-51 incorporates updated federal language, updates the names of two agencies, and combines two sections.

Regulations governing provision of services in vocational rehabilitation are intended to guide and direct the DBVI in serving Virginia’s blind or vision impaired citizen’s seeking to obtain or maintain employment. Repealing current and promulgating new regulations ensures that Virginia is compliance with federal regulations and continues to provide viable services to the citizens of the Commonwealth

Substance

Since 1990 when 22 VAC 45-50 was last revised, the agency name was changed from the Department for the Visually Handicapped to the Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired. Additionally, an agency name change occurred with the Virginia Office for Protection and Advocacy, formally known as the Department for the Rights of Virginian’s with Disabilities.

The new regulation incorporates updated federal language and combines two sections.

Alternatives

The DBVI Administration considered revision of 22 VAC 45-50 and determined the changes to be substantial enough to warrant repealing the regulations while promulgating new ones.

A public hearing will not be held.
