This regulation lists, by scientific and common name, plant and insect species that the Board of

Agriculture and Consumer Services (Board) has declared to be a threatened or endangered

species as defined in the Virginia Endangered Plant and Insect Species Act.

Basis

§ 3.1-1025 of the Code of Virginia (1950), as amended, gives the Board the authority to prescribe and adopt regulations including, but not limited to, the listing of endangered or threatened species, their taking, quotas, seasons, buying, selling, possessing, monitoring or movement, investigating, protecting, or any other need in furtherance of the purposes of the Virginia Endangered Plant and Insect Species Act.

Whether the regulation is mandated by state law or not is not clear. There appears to be a conflict in the authorizing statute. §3.1-1025(A) of the Code of Virginia states that:

"the Board may prescribe and adopt regulations including, but not limited to the listing of endangered or threatened species....."

However, §3.1-1025(D) states that as a result of investigations by the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services and recommendations of the Department of Conservation and Recreation:

"....the Board shall approve proposed species to be added to or deleted from the list of endangered species or the list of threatened species, or to be transferred from one list to the other."

For the purpose of this statement, deference is given to authority contained in §3.1-1025(D) that the regulation is mandated by state law.

Public Comment

The Department published its notice in The Virginia Register of Regulations on April 10, 2000 advertising the opportunity to comment on this regulation pursuant to Executive Order Number Twenty-five (98). An informal advisory group was not formed for the purpose of assisting with this periodic review.

Public comment was provided by the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation, Division of Natural Heritage, which recommends eliminating three plant species from the regulation and adding twenty plant species and seven insect species to the regulation.

VDACS has reviewed the recommendations provided by the Department of Conservation and Recreation and agrees that the regulation should be amended. We concur with the recommendation to remove three plant species from the regulation. We believe there is merit in listing sixteen of the recommended plant and insect species as threatened or endangered; however, there is not evidence of sufficient global rarity for the remaining eleven plants and insects to be considered for listing at this time even though the species may be rare in Virginia.

Effectiveness

Preservation of bio-diversity through the protection of rare, threatened or endangered species is an important function of state government. Preserving bio-diversity and genetic variability, in both wild and domesticated plants, will be vital to the economics and survival of humankind. With the advent of biotechnology, the potential advances and possibilities for the exchange of genetic traits between plants is virtually unlimited. Every time a species is allowed to become extinct, a storehouse of genetic material is lost and can never be replaced.

Listing a species as threatened or endangered under the regulation offers protection to plants that are of aesthetic, ecological, educational, scientific, economic, or other value to the Commonwealth of Virginia. Listing a species provides for the development and implementation of biologically sound and economically feasible protection, recovery, and conservation measures to assure the survival of listed species.

The regulation also offers protection to landowners by protecting listed species on their property from other individuals while not restricting the rights of the private property owner.

The regulation has no impact on the health, safety and welfare of man.

The regulation is clearly written and understood by the individuals and entities affected.

Alternatives

Due to the mandate for this regulation in accordance with §3.1-1025(D) of the Code of Virginia (1950), as amended, an alternative measure does not exist.

Recommendation

Staff will recommend to the Board that the regulation be amended. The status of three currently listed plants has improved. Since they are no longer considered globally rare, they should be removed from the regulation. In addition, VDACS recommends that ten threatened or endangered plant species and six threatened or endangered insect species be added to the regulation since they are considered rare both globally and in Virginia.

Substance of Proposed Action

The listed ranking of known biological rarity was supplied by the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation's Natural Heritage Division.
