MS. SHIPMAN: This is the new meeting, the first meeting of 2019 with our new structure. So bear with me. There's a few of us in the room who have been in -- on this committee for a long time.

So bear with us as we kind of learn this new way and learn all of you all.

And Tim's laughing. And just make a plan from here. The agenda today is going to be, actually, I think a lot of fun.

So I'm glad there's people in the room that have a lot of ties to the community because we're going to be looking for your input. I'm going to pass around the roster.

Sign by your name if you have a position here. If you do not, please sign on the back as a guest. Okay? Let's just start with Sara Beth. I'm Karen Shipman. I think I know everybody -- well, I do not.

1	I'm going to take time I'm sorry. I'll
2	I'm not pointing at you, but I I'm
3	trying do I know everybody, no, I don't.
4	So let's go around and make some
5	introductions.
6	I'm Karen Shipman. I'm the
7	trauma outreach coordinator at VCU Medical
8	Center, and also work very closely with our
9	Injury and Violence Prevention program.

11	MS. DINWIDDIE: I'm Sara Beth
12	Dinwiddie. I am the trauma outreach
13	coordinator for Carilion Clinic, Roanoke
14	Memorial.
15	
16	MS. BAILEY: Rachel Bailey. I'm
17	the trauma educator and and PI at
18	Johnston-Willis.
19	
20	MS. WATKINS: Linda Watkins, injury
21	prevention outreach, Inova Health System.

24	cross member from Pre-Hospital. I'm a
25	flight nurse employee.

19	MS. VINCENT: Hi, I'm Amy Vincent.
20	I'm the assistant director of injury and
21	violence prevention at VCU Health.
22	
23	MS. LUCAS: I am Jill Lucas, and I
24	am childhood injury prevention at Carilion
25	Children's in Posnoke

MS. TREVILIAN: Tanya Trevilian,
pediatric trauma program manager, Carilion
Children's of Roanoke.

MR. MCKAY: Tim McKay. I'm here as the fire service crossover from Pre-Hospital. And I'm the -- the deputy fire chief for Chesterfield County Fire and EMS.

MS. SHIPMAN: Okay, great. So again, welcome, everyone. To the agenda -- oh, we passed the agenda out. And just since -- while we were doing introductions, you heard that there were a couple of crossovers.

So what they're doing -- what we're doing is having members of each committee be able to cross over to other committees that they may have an interest in, or may be able to make some difference in. So one of the things we'll do today, we have to select someone to go to the System Improvement Committee, which meets tomorrow I believe at 8:00 a.m. So it would be one

of our members. We don't know who to choose 1 right now because we haven't filled a lot of 2 3 our spots. So we will talk about doing that 4 today. So we will talk about doing 5 that today as -- as a committee. So just so 6 you know, when they say crossover, that's 7 where that's coming from. So the agenda is 8 9 coming around. 10 After you get it, we will take motions to approve the agenda. So can I 11 get a motion to approve the agenda for 12 13 today? 14 15 COMMITTEE MEMBER: I move to 16 approve. 17 MS. SHIPMAN: Second? 18 19 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Second. 20 21 MS. SHIPMAN: All in favor? 22 23 COMMITTEE MEMBERS: 24 Aye. 25

MS. SHIPMAN: I do not have a 1 Chair's report. I'll probably be thinking 2 of things as we go along as the Chair to 3 share with you. I guess, one thing I'll 4 just bring up is the new structure. 5 Took a while for them to 6 7 schedule meetings, so that some of the meetings are going to have crossovers aren't 8 9 occurring at the same time. 10 Which is why those of you who have come to these meetings before are 11 seeing new structure, new schedule, new 12 dates and times, that kind of thing. 13 So our meeting will always be 14 15 at 3:00 o'clock on the quarterly day 16 assigned. And I believe -- are we meeting 17 here now --18 MS. STREET: Yes. 19 20 MS. SHIPMAN: -- in the future? 21 22 MS. STREET: At least, the May one 23 24 and the August one, yes. 25

MS. SHIPMAN: Okay. So May and August, we will be meeting here at 3:00 o'clock. And then tomorrow -- tomorrow, other meetings occur. So that's one thing to -- to -- to be aware of.

Let me see -- so again, we have to send someone to the System

Improvement Committee. As of now, there are two voting members sitting in the room.

That's me and Sara -- actually Sara because I don't get a vote.

So I think Sara Beth is going to attend tomorrow for our committee. And then we may look in the future if someone else -- if she really wants to keep that role or just -- but you're going to be here.

So she's going to attend tomorrow. I'm going to pass around the -- our goals and objectives. I think that's really going to be helpful when we start talking about filling these positions, but -- okay.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: Thank you.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: Thanks.

MS. SHIPMAN: The next thing I'm going to pass around is -- back in the fall, when we knew we were going to be restructuring and were going to have to start looking at some of our community organizations and committee --- and community members.

We -- as a team -- kind of drafted a list and brain-stormed as to some places to draw these members from to fill these holes. So don't I have -- do I have one of these? Oh, I do.

So I'm going to pass this around. This is our roster. And this shows you were the vacancies are and where -- what they would like for the representatives to come from.

So judicial system, community advocacy, which -- that can be anything. So -- so I'm going to pass this around. It shows the positions that are filled and then it shows where we have holes. And essentially, what we're going to do today is

brain-storm. I want you all's input, especially those of you who are active in your communities and know a lot of the community organizations.

This is coming around. It's a graph of suggestions that we have for each position. And then at the bottom, there's just a whole list for ad hoc members.

We're actually going to call them liaisons and not ad hoc. So one thing Dr. Aboutanos would like for us to do is even though we fill these positions with a designated person, still let's get a list of people to invite to be liaisons.

Because Injury Prevention is so big and we want represent -representation from all over the State. We want people to come that have an interest in Injury Prevention to offer ideas, help solve issues, tell us what they're doing in their area.

So it's going to be more than this chart right here. Okay, so I'm going to give you a few minutes just to kind of look at that.

5	MS. SHIPMAN: Oh. Sara and I can
6	share.

8	MS. DINWIDDIE: Mm-hmm.
9	
10	MS. SHIPMAN: Which do y'all
11	need both of these?

13	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah. Actually
14	they need one.
15	
16	MS. SHIPMAN: Take both of those.
17	
18	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Actually we got
19	that one. Choose
20	
21	MS. SHIPMAN: That one?
22	
23	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah.
24	
25	MS. SHIPMAN: Okay. Thank you. Is

that enough? Everybody have access to one? 1 I guess we'll have to share. 2 3 MS. STREET: We'll share. 4 5 MS. SHIPMAN: I have an extra of 6 7 the committee list if you need to have that. So --8 9 10 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Thank you. 11 MS. SHIPMAN: Okay, thank you. 12 There you go. Thank you. So look at our 13 vacancies. Look at the list of suggestions 14 15 that we came up with. 16 And I'm -- essentially, we're just going to have an open discussion 17 because I just want everyone's input, more 18 If you see someone not represented 19 ideas. that maybe should be. Any questions? 20 The other thing I would --21 maybe as -- if you think of someone in 22 addition to what we have listed, we have 23 note pads pretty much all over the room if 24 you need one. Maybe just make a note of it 25

so that way, we add it to the list. Maybe they won't be a position on the committee, but we can certainly invite them to be liaisons. And -- and invite them to our meetings every quarter.

So let's go down the list of the -- the committee itself and just kind of take each position -- I guess that's the easiest thing to do -- each position individually based on our graph.

Looking for specific people or if you know the leader of a department.

Some of these organizations -- what we're going to have to do is reach out to the director or the leader to say, who do you want on point.

Rather than going to maybe somebody we know because they're going to have to still clear it with, obviously, their organization.

The other thing to keep in mind, too, is -- again, we really want statewide representation. The meetings will always take place in Richmond. And it is central, but we definitely want -- and a lot

of the organizations that are listed here
like VDH and, you know, the AG's office and
that kind of thing, they're going to be
based out of Richmond. But we really want
representation from all over.

Because that's what's going to make us successful. You know, whether it's somebody on the committee that can have a vote, or whether if it's a liaison that comes in and tells us, again, what they're doing, suggestions on how to make something work.

So if anyone -- so let's take the first one that's vacant, the VDH Aging and Rehab Services. This is not a -- an organization that I am terribly familiar with.

That would just be -- I mean, it's a specific one. Does anyone have any other -- any suggestions as to who to reach out for that? Or if you think of a good representation -- a representative?

COMMITTEE MEMBER: So is the goal of that one is to try to get someone that

25	COMMITTEE MEMBER: particular

4	connection to them?

6	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah.

9	was actually pretty specific. So

12	think that would be hard to find a contact.

17	they're staff.
18	
19	MS. SHIPMAN: Well, that's going to
20	be that's probably going to be a
21	challenge, too, is making sure because
22	their staff you know, staffing across the
23	State and work a lot with community
24	organizations. All right. So the next one,
25	the epidemiologist. And I think Lisa Luton

[sp] was going to take that on with the VDH. 1 So we'll skip that one. Lisa can't be here 2 3 today. She had to make a quick trip to Alexandria. 4 5 She's our VDH representative. State Police. Again, we'll have to go 6 7 through the correct channels, but think about geography and where a good 8 9 representative would come from. And I --10 actually, I'm looking at our Fire/EMS people. Maybe some --11 12 13 COMMITTEE MEMBER: We're -- I got some connections with the State Police. 14 15 MS. SHIPMAN: Say again? 16 17 COMMITTEE MEMBER: I said I've got 18 some connections with the State Police. 19 20 21 MS. SHIPMAN: Okay. Okay. 22 COMMITTEE MEMBER: I used to work 23 No, I can -- we can certainly reach 24 there. The -- where -- what are we lacking in 25 out.

1	terms of geographic distribution?
2	
3	MS. SHIPMAN: Well, right now, we
4	have
5	
6	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Because I don't
7	know
8	
9	MS. SHIPMAN: we have Richmond.
10	We have Roanoke.
11	
12	COMMITTEE MEMBER: NOVA or
13	Tidewater?
14	
15	MS. SHIPMAN: Neither right now.
16	
17	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Neither?
18	
19	MS. SHIPMAN: Neither right now.
20	
21	COMMITTEE MEMBER: What division do
22	you want?
23	
24	MS. SHIPMAN: So
25	

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COMMITTEE MEMBER: I think it would 1 be nice if we could find something for 2 3 Hampton Roads. Or our --4 5 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Let's get something --6 7 COMMITTEE MEMBER: -- peninsula, 8 because there's a lot of -- there's a need 9 10 -- in terms of violence prevention. And we're doing some work down in our area. 11 So I think that would be good. 12 And I think they're -- I know 13 there's local police that are actively 14 15 trying to establish relationships in the high risk neighborhoods that probably have a 16 real passion around injury prevention. 17 That's part of their mission. 18 So I know that the -- because I think maybe 19 the chief of police -- that's what, Newport 20 News -- has been on the news a lot about 21 22 some of the things that he's -- he's trying to do. 23 24

Is that Steve Drew?

MS. SHIPMAN:

1	COMMITTEE MEMBER: I don't know his
2	name.
3	
4	MS. SHIPMAN: He came from did
5	he come from is that the one that came
6	from Richmond?
7	
8	COMMITTEE MEMBER: I don't know.
9	
10	MS. SHIPMAN: I think it's Steve
11	Drew.
12	EDTIFIED OOD
13	COMMITTEE MEMBER: I think it's
14	Steve Drew.
15	
16	MS. SHIPMAN: He's awesome.
17	
18	COMMITTEE MEMBER: He's been going
19	around to the neighborhoods talking to
20	people. And Lou Ann Miller who's from
21	Riverside, they're over on that side of the
22	border.
23	And they I'm at Norfolk
24	General. We get our share, but they I
25	think they have more than we have.

1	MS. SHIPMAN: So do you maybe
2	
3	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Well, there's
4	the Tourism and the Water and
5	
6	MS. SHIPMAN: Yeah.
7	
8	COMMITTEE MEMBER: There are so
9	many things in the Hampton Roads area that
10	lend itself to
11	
12	MS. SHIPMAN: Yeah, yeah.
13	$-K \sqcup F \sqcup$
14	COMMITTEE MEMBER: And this would
15	be yeah, I think that I think probably
16	if we could look down and do you have
17	connections down there?
18	
19	COMMITTEE MEMBER: I mean, are we
20	relegated to the State Police?
21	
22	MS. SHIPMAN: Mm-hmm.
23	
24	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Is that
25	

1	MS. SHIPMAN: I think
2	
3	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Theoretically,
4	they would be representing law enforcement
5	generically.
6	
7	MS. SHIPMAN: Yeah.
8	
9	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Just some
10	
11	COMMITTEE MEMBER: And the thought
12	process was somebody who had a connection to
13	a statewide coverage.
14	
15	MS. SHIPMAN: Yeah.
16	
17	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Well, there
18	there the sheriffs and the police chiefs
19	have associations that are pretty tight. I
20	mean
21	
22	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah.
23	
24	COMMITTEE MEMBER: and I think
25	that would be that would be a good place

to start. Our -- our police department in 1 Blacksburg does a lot of injury prevention 2 3 and anti-violence work, too. They have 4 campaigns. So I -- I would think that 5 we're relegating the State Police -- you'd 6 7 know more about the State Police than I do. 8 9 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Mm-hmm. 10 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Do you think 11 that -- is it -- but it injury prevention 12 something that's prevalent in State Police's 13 mission? Or is it more --14 15 It is, but it's 16 COMMITTEE MEMBER: -- it's traffic centered. 17 18 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right. 19 20 COMMITTEE MEMBER: I mean, that's 21 -- that's going to be their -- their focus. 22 23 COMMITTEE MEMBER: I would suggest 24 that you just take a leap and go with 25

somebody involved in local law enforcement 1 or somebody from maybe the police chief or 2 the sheriff's association. 3 4 MS. SHIPMAN: Mm-hmm. 5 6 7 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Maybe contact the Virginia Police Chiefs Association. 8 9 10 MS. SHIPMAN: Yeah. 11 COMMITTEE MEMBER: The -- the 12 13 advantage of the State Police is that they have, you know, on the -- outside of the 14 traffic realm, on the criminal side --15 they're the clearinghouse for all of the 16 crime data from across the Commonwealth. 17 18 MS. SHIPMAN: Mm-hmm. 19 20 21 COMMITTEE MEMBER: So they -they've got all those numbers of the kinds 2.2. of violent crimes. And -- and I think that 23 may be the reason that somebody said stay --24 I mean --25

MS. SHIPMAN: That was part of it.

I think some of their -- so their

[unintelligible] program is a statewide -
pushing to be a statewide program. And so,

just looking for kind of that common entity

in trying to identify what's going on around

the State.

And then when that person can come into the room and talk about what -- what should be going on around the state, what are we missing in different pieces of the state.

I mean, how do we take what is working in one locality and hope -- conform that to work in another. It's not that it's going to just transfer over.

A great example is some of the stuff -- the bleed stuff that we've been doing. The VCU people didn't have -- didn't have any idea that it was currently going on in southwest Virginia.

And so just opening that communication -- and we kind of were thinking that the State Police might would be the -- the biggest voice. But we --

1	obviously, could be wrong in that manner,
2	too.
3	
4	COMMITTEE MEMBER: And this, you
5	know, they I think outside. The the
6	struggle there is we want someone from
7	Hampton Roads, let's say.
8	They they may send you
9	someone from Richmond because that's the
10	person who has the information which you
11	seek.
12	And and that's what they're
13	doing today. And in two months. And that
14	individual is in Grundy doing something
15	entirely I mean, really, that's that's
16	how they operate. So
17	
18	COMMITTEE MEMBER: That's true.
19	
20	COMMITTEE MEMBER: do you you
21	can't be guaranteed consistency or
22	continuity from a
23	
24	COMMITTEE MEMBER: From the State
25	Police.

1	COMMITTEE MEMBER: a human being
2	standpoint. I think they would maintain
3	participation in whatever they committed to.
4	
5	MS. SHIPMAN: So what if we should
6	take it back and I'm sorry.
7	
8	COMMITTEE MEMBER: We could have a
9	little leeway for
10	
11	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Law enforcement.
12	EDTIFIED OOD
13	COMMITTEE MEMBER: law just
14	law enforcement as opposed to State Police.
15	
16	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah.
17	
18	COMMITTEE MEMBER: I mean, the
19	current data is available publicly. We
20	ought to be able to get that.
21	
22	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right.
23	
24	MS. SHIPMAN: Yeah, yeah. Yeah.
25	

COMMITTEE MEMBER: I don't think we need an insider necessarily.

MS. SHIPMAN: Well, they -- I think what Sara was saying with that, just having someone from the area that says, this is what we're doing here.

This is what we're seeing here, which -- you know, Hampton Roads may be different than, you know, southwest Virginia may be different NOVA.

But to have someone at the table to just talk about what they're seeing in their community. And then again, hopefully more law enforcement come -- will attend as our liaisons that can then talk about what they're seeing in their jurisdictions.

So -- but let me go back because we have to report out tomorrow. I have to report. And I'll ask the powers that be if we can change State Police to just law enforcement. I think that makes sense, actually.

1	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Mm-hmm.
2	
3	MS. SHIPMAN: Okay. The next
4	position, someone from the judicial system.
5	Again, these are really broad. Look at Amy,
6	she's like these are really broad topics.
7	
8	MS. VINCENT: I just think they're
9	
10	
11	MS. SHIPMAN: And so we looked at
12	the Department of Criminal Justice. We
13	looked for things like school and safety.
14	We looked at, again, law enforcement. We
15	looked at victim services.
16	Those are some of the things
17	that are listed on the on the chart.
18	Some I heard that someone was saying
19	something. So
20	
21	COMMITTEE MEMBER: So how does I
22	guess maybe you answered the question. So
23	just trying to figure out the difference
24	between that and the representative from the
25	Attorney General's Office. We're not just

1	talking about attorneys, we're talking about
2	
3	
4	MS. SHIPMAN: The Attorney
5	General's Office, we actually went to kind
6	kind of down the road and may need some
7	more social services.
8	
9	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Mm-hmm.
10	
11	MS. SHIPMAN: And more of a legal
12	maybe not just someone like an attorney,
13	but somebody with more of a legal background
14	
15	
16	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Okay.
17	
18	MS. SHIPMAN: as opposed to the
19	judicial system representative which could
20	be some other representatives. I know
21	and they do intersect.
22	
23	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah.
24	
25	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Okay. I know a

lot of the like at the need programs. 1 2 3 MS. SHIPMAN: Uh-huh. 4 COMMITTEE MEMBER: They have maybe 5 victims' advocates and stuff. Like the Safe 6 7 Harbor and the -- something else, but those kind of people. 8 9 10 MS. SHIPMAN: Okay. And we -- I think we may have looked at them. Let me 11 look at them from the back, yes. For the 12 liaisons. But that's actually a really good 13 idea. 14 15 16 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah. You know, the ones that go to court with them or will 17 sit with them in an exam room, those kind of 18 things. 19 20 MS. SHIPMAN: Any other suggestions 21 for a judicial system representative? 22 Again, think statewide. Think, you know --23 and especially -- and if it's someone you 24 know personally that you think would be 25

1	really good, I'm all for that. Again, we
2	may have to go to their leader, their
3	director to ask so that they can be
4	appointed.
5	
6	COMMITTEE MEMBER: I have a friend
7	that works in the Attorney General's office.
8	He's an attorney in Norfolk. But I could
9	talk to him because he might not
10	necessarily him, but he might have staff or
11	know someone
12	EDTIFIED COD
13	MS. SHIPMAN: Mm-hmm.
14	
15	COMMITTEE MEMBER: that has a
16	real passion around this that he could
17	recommend.
18	
19	MS. SHIPMAN: Okay.
20	
21	COMMITTEE MEMBER: I could
22	certainly ask him.
23	
24	COMMITTEE MEMBER: I also know
25	people at the AG's office that are doing

this kind of work already --1 2 3 MS. SHIPMAN: Mm-hmm. 4 COMMITTEE MEMBER: -- that actually 5 might be a good fit. 6 7 MS. SHIPMAN: Yeah. 8 9 10 COMMITTEE MEMBER: So you know, people reach out, see where we could end up. 11 12 13 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right. You know, and like to -- I think what I -- we --14 15 we just recently, at Norfolk General, we've created a -- a committee within our 16 community of people to come together to talk 17 about qun violence. 18 And I think one of the things 19 that I suggested to the group that --20 initially to our group and they've been a 21 little -- they were a little uncomfortable 2.2. with the -- the concept. Because they 23 didn't want to feel like we were targeting 24

people. But I think it's important that you

have diversity. And I think that it's 1 really important, especially when it comes 2 3 to -- in my mind for us in our area, in terms of violence prevention. 4 A large number of the -- the 5 individuals that we see are African-6 7 American. So if we're going to try to focus on that, I think we need to have some people 8 9 from the community at the table, too. 10 Because then we get away from this, you're targeting us when we're all 11 coming together to look at it. And I think 12 we need to have people that look like us and 13 people that don't look like us at the table 14 15 trying to figure it out. 16 MS. SHIPMAN: I think that's a 17 great idea. 18 19 COMMITTEE MEMBER: And I -- I 20 definitely second that. And I would 21 actually give citizen representation a 22 little more than one slot. 23

MS. SHIPMAN:

Yeah, mm-hmm.

24

1 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Because then
2 you're asking like one person to represent
3 everybody. So figuring out how do you -4 like have a youth representative, an adult

representative, you know.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: You know, there are some people that are doing some really invasive things within a high risk communities as civic league presidents. And they may, you know, work at Walmart.

I mean, they may not have an executive job, but they're out there working with young people, doing baseball. They're pulling gangs together and talking to people.

And those people are the people that we want to advise us and kind of help direct us as to how to get to those people.

Another group of people that is really kind of important, especially within the black community is the black churches. Because the minister has a lot of power and a lot of black churches can --

they minister to, you know, the high risk 1 communities. And people feel very 2 comfortable to the ministers. 3 And we were able to pull in 4 about four ministers that have offered their 5 churches as a -- as a place to meet and 6 talk. 7 So --8 9 MS. SHIPMAN: Okay. 10 COMMITTEE MEMBER: -- I think 11 that's important. 12 13 That's a good idea. MS. SHIPMAN: 14 15 COMMITTEE MEMBER: 16 Yeah. 17 MS. SHIPMAN: And I think -- that's 18 19 the -- I think that's the -- that's going to be the challenge of our committee. Plus the 20 beauty of the committee. This -- this can 21 not just be this list --22 23 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah. 24 25

1 2

MS. SHIPMAN: -- if we want to accomplish the goals that have been set forth for us. So I'm liking the brain-storming. Again, you know, just -- I don't know that we're going to come up with any definite assignments today, and that's fine.

They'll just have to accept that tomorrow. So -- but I think because you all are new -- you all are -- some of you all haven't been here before. So we -- we want your input. And you wanted to say something else.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: Well -- and that -- that is the beauty of the way that these committees are set up is to invite the general public, and so that that voice is there.

MS. SHIPMAN: Mm-hmm.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: So just because they don't have that -- that -- that phobia see thingy doesn't mean that that's a closed door and they're not wanted. Because we

1	definitely want to be able to cover the
2	entire state and have we need those
3	voices to be able to know how to do that.
4	
5	MS. SHIPMAN: Most definitely.
6	
7	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Are we are we
8	taking nominations for
9	
10	MS. SHIPMAN: Positions?
11	
12	COMMITTEE MEMBER: positions?
13	-KIIFIFI)(COP)
14	MS. SHIPMAN: Well, that actually
15	I was going to well, I'm supposed to
16	so even if we don't have a quorum.
17	
18	MS. SHIPMAN: We don't have a
19	quorum today, so we won't be making a
20	decision
21	
22	COMMITTEE MEMBER: To recommend
23	Deborah Battle for that Attorney General's
24	position. And she's their community
25	outreach coordinator.

1	MS. SHIPMAN: She's the outreach
2	coordinator?
3	
4	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Outreach
5	coordinator. Community outreach
6	coordinator.
7	
8	MS. SHIPMAN: And again, I don't
9	know if any of you know some of those
10	similar roles in other parts of the state.
11	We are kind of Roanoke heavy, I think. But

14	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Few
15	
16	MS. SHIPMAN: And and she may
17	know, you know, a contact person from some
18	other part of the state.
19	
20	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Okay.

22	COMMITTEE MEMBER: And you know,
23	there may be outreach person in your area.
24	So
25	

1 MS. SHIPMAN: Okay. 2 3 COMMITTEE MEMBER: We kind of skipped over the judicial system, I think. 4 But I -- I was going to ask a question. 5 6 7 MS. SHIPMAN: Okay. 8 9 COMMITTEE MEMBER: You know, I've 10 been a part of some very similar organizing, and the City approach around the Violence 11 Prevention. 12 And we do have the judicial 13 system involved, and I actually think it's 14 15 an important piece if you're talking about violence prevention. 16 And what we look at for 17 representation is, of course, service unit 18 for -- for us in Richmond for there to be 19 this direction. 20 21 And because they play a role in keeping young people out of their 22

23

juvenile justice system. And that's sort of

their goal is to keep people out. It's one

of their new priorities advised heavily by

the ten years -- at least in Richmond. 1 assume across the state. But I would highly 2 3 recommend, you know, involving Court Service units in this type of work as well. 4 You know, I know Richmond, so 5 I mean, I have made contacts in Richmond. 6 7 But I'm also happy to coordinate with the person in Richmond on a location from other 8 9 parts of the state if you think that's worth it. 10 11 MS. SHIPMAN: I would say yes. We 12 13 do have a representative that was appointed from the State Public School System, Tracey 14 15 White. So committee -- until we --16 Community Advocacy Group. 17 COMMITTEE MEMBER: It matters 18 definitely where we can tie those churches 19 20 21 MS. SHIPMAN: Yeah, that's --22 23 COMMITTEE MEMBER: What about the 24 Urban League? 25

MS. SHIPMAN: That's a good idea. 1 2 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Kind of like the 3 LLA's. I mean, a [unintelligible] 4 community, a larger community has the -- is 5 it LA still or is it the A, Area Office on 6 7 Aging. Something league of older Americans. I think it's the AO -- what is it now? 8 9 10 COMMITTEE MEMBER: I think you said it when you said --11 12 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Area something 13 Aging, I don't know. It might be -- you 14 15 know, the elderly population. 16 MS. SHIPMAN: Mm-hmm. I think 17 what's hard or challenging about assigning 18 some of these is -- is there's so many 19 different patterns of injury. 20 So -- and that's one thing we 21 talk about is, you know, we may not have a 22 brain injury association person assigned to 23

be a discussion, we want to make sure we

the -- our committee, but if that's going to

1	have someone from that organization in the
2	room. And I I'm just throwing that out
3	there.
4	
5	COMMITTEE MEMBER: And and sort
6	of exchange that goes with this, and I see
7	the goals and objectives. And I read them.
8	But how do you select committee members when
9	you don't know what they're focusing on?
10	Yeah, I find my own approach
11	was so broad. Is it is it that my brain
12	can go there. And I'm like, I don't really
13	know
14	
15	MS. SHIPMAN: It is. And that's
16	that's been the last fall when we sat
17	down, that's why there's this list at the
18	end of
19	
20	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah.
21	
22	MS. SHIPMAN: you know, is if
23	this list is all these people and that
24	that was that was what we struggled with
25	lagt fall

1	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah.
2	
3	MS. SHIPMAN: because it's not
4	just this these people that can that
5	we want in the room. And you're right,
6	because the goal say if we start seeing
7	an increase in a particular injury pattern.
8	Well, we're going to want them
9	in the room to start addressing it from what
10	we're seeing throughout the state. So it's
11	it can't just be this that's going to
12	hopefully attend and be active.
13	But then, we have to decide
14	who do want on these slots that can give us
15	a good overall picture. But
16	
17	COMMITTEE MEMBER: I think that
18	
19	MS. SHIPMAN: Trust me, we have
20	
21	COMMITTEE MEMBER: You've had the
22	conversation.
23	
24	MS. SHIPMAN: We had we had the
25	conversations last year when we when we

were given this to do. And I'm like, oh, my 1 -- that's what -- because [unintelligible] 2 3 it's like, yeah. 4 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Then we have to 5 narrow it. I feel like there'd be so many 6 7 different people who would fit into those slots. 8 9 10 MS. SHIPMAN: Exactly. 11 COMMITTEE MEMBER: That's having 12 13 the one person representing is also leading out leaving out like a huge chunk. 14 15 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Mm-hmm. 16 17 MS. SHIPMAN: But do keep in mind 18 that these people who are on this committee 19 need to be very open minded. 20 21 COMMITTEE MEMBER: 22 True. 23 MS. SHIPMAN: And they need to be 24 able to hear that content expert that comes 25

into the room and make suggestions. And so that's really what we want out of those people that are going to sit on that voting panel is to be able to recognize when a content expert walks into the room and tells you this is what we need for this type of injury pattern.

Then we're going to be able to vote to support that. And so I think it's really easy to kind of get that tunnel vision and get down in the nitty-gritty of -- in -- a lot of us are nurses and that's like what we do is get stuff done.

And then we got sent back several times in the last three years and told to go back and we need a plan for that plan that you just made. And so it's really easy to get stuck on those pieces.

And so trying to keep it very broad in the big oversight picture. And just keep in mind what are big goal is, is to identify a systematic approach to injury prevention throughout the Commonwealth.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: So here's my

question, is that I see a lot of state agencies. And I think that that makes so much sense. I guess that when it comes to community and advocacy group representatives, that kind of gets a little bit trickier.

MS. SHIPMAN: Right. And so what
is that state agency that's going to
represent those community groups? And it's
-- that's a very difficult question to
answer, I think.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: It is.

MS. SHIPMAN: And actually when we were looking at this, we kind of went not just citizen and not an organize -- but we -- that's when we started talking about the local libraries.

That you know, and your idea about the Urban League. You know, like that actually got kind of, you know, several -- that would fit in several spots. But that's -- we kind of started looking at who's out

there seeing all the injuries. So you know, 1 at the libraries, the churches. And -- but 2 3 then how do you choose one? Because you know, one from 4 Inova may see something different than we're 5 seeing in Richmond, than they're seeing in 6 Roanoke, than -- you know. 7 So --8 9 COMMITTEE MEMBER: And what occurs 10 in our rural communities, which is --11 MS. SHIPMAN: Exactly. 12 13 14 COMMITTEE MEMBER: And that's 15 different than our urban cities. 16 17 Yes. Well, I think MS. SHIPMAN: 18 that we have data in our registry and I 19 think that we probably would be well served 20 if we pull some data to -- to determine what 21 -- you know, what the injuries are. 22 And then kind of figure out 23 where they are. I think that, you know, 24

we're trying -- and I can only give input

based on what I see in my center. And that 1 may not be what we're seeing broadly. Or it 2 3 could be what everyone else is seeing. 4 5 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right. 6 7 MS. SHIPMAN: But I think that we have -- we have a registry where everybody 8 9 reports their information. So I -- I think 10 we could probably answer some questions by knowing what's in the registry and what --11 what -- what we are seeing throughout the 12 Commonwealth. 13 And what are the big ones that 14 15 we can decide what are the things that we're going to focus on for this year. And then 16 17 maybe -- you know, you do another assessment and then you figure out where you're going. 18 19 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right. 20 21 22 MS. SHIPMAN: Because we might -- I might think that we should focus on 23 something. But when you look at it 24

25

throughout the Commonwealth, it may not --

it might just be unique to me. 1 2 3 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right. 4 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Mm-hmm. 5 6 7 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right. 8 COMMITTEE MEMBER: And I think that 9 10 that would help, you know, who sits on the committee. Because if you know where --11 where you have, you know, the most incidents 12 13 of injury and maybe where the gaps are, because maybe it's where the gaps is where 14 you need to be able fill those committee 15 positions. 16 17 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Uh-huh. 18 19 20 COMMITTEE MEMBER: And especially 21 in the community advocacy group. I mean, that's important. It's almost impossible 22 23 have the answer without having more information about what we're seeing across 24 the state. 25

1	MS. SHIPMAN: Mm-hmm.
2	
3	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Injuries,
4	they're very regional. I mean, where I work
5	now, I see 20 little old ladies a day.
6	Where I worked in Petersburg, I saw two to
7	three gunshots a day.
8	So, it's still like that.
9	It's been like that, it's going to be like
10	that. So you know, it's hard to pinpoint a
11	specific injury.
12	
13	MS. SHIPMAN: Trust me, we feel it.
14	
15	COMMITTEE MEMBER: It's a it's a
16	big task.
17	
18	MS. SHIPMAN: It is, and I think
19	easier than, I think, than what was thought
20	in the beginning.
21	
22	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Mm-hmm.
23	
24	MS. SHIPMAN: I'll just say that.
25	So I don't I don't know that and

again, I don't know that we're going to
select people today. I -- I get that
totally. But I like the ideas, I like what
y'all are bringing.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: Mm-hmm.

MS. SHIPMAN: And it may be that we need to go back and pull the data and say, you know, what are we seeing. But then, we're still going only be able to bring in one person from one area. And that --

COMMITTEE MEMBER: And see, I don't think that works. I mean, I know I just -- this is my first day, and I'm like, you guys, this doesn't work. That's terrible.

But I just -- like how do you represent the state with one person, unless like you can have -- I don't know, like that you have that person votes for the rest of that, whatever they're representing. And that's the --

(Several committee members started speaking

1	all at once.)
2	
3	COMMITTEE MEMBER: You're voting
4	for your area.
5	
6	COMMITTEE MEMBER: You're not
7	fighting for the motor vehicle collision.
8	
9	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right.
10	
11	COMMITTEE MEMBER: You're not
12	fighting for falls. You're here as a
13	representative for the entire state.
14	
15	COMMITTEE MEMBER: That makes more
16	sense to me.
17	
18	MS. SHIPMAN: Yeah, you're here to
19	represent the state in your position.
20	
21	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Okay.
22	
23	COMMITTEE MEMBER: And bring your
24	content and what you know.
25	

1	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yes.
2	
3	MS. SHIPMAN: But also be able to
4	step outside of that bubble and and
5	recognize that your what you deal with
6	may not be the biggest issue in the state or
7	what needs the loudest voice at the moment.
8	And that's really to be
9	honest, I'm really excited to see so many
10	people in the room because it's been the
11	outreach coordinators from the hospitals in
12	in this group from the beginning.
13	And so it's really cool to
14	actually have outside voice coming in to
15	help us now. Yeah.
16	
17	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Well, I think we
18	had discussed before possibly bringing in
19	TSN person in
20	
21	MS. SHIPMAN: Mm-hmm.
22	
23	COMMITTEE MEMBER: because they
24	see the injuries across the board.
25	

1	MS. SHIPMAN: Yes, yes.
2	
3	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Bringing who in?
4	
5	COMMITTEE MEMBER: The trauma
6	survivor network.
7	
8	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Oh, oh.
9	
10	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Trauma survivor
11	network coordinator.
12	TOTICIO OOD
13	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Yeah.
14	
15	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right.
16	
17	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Because most of
18	the larger hospitals do have that program.
19	And I just think that represents more across
20	the board as far as injury.
21	
22	MS. SHIPMAN: And that's I mean,
23	yeah, we talk because and I know
24	because we have a TSN. And what did you
25	have to say? Y'all and Fairfax has the

1	most active, I think the most robust.
2	
3	COMMITTEE MEMBER: We'll eventually
4	the advocacy group.
5	
6	MS. SHIPMAN: It could be the
7	that could be the advocacy group.
8	
9	COMMITTEE MEMBER: That's where a
10	lot of a lot of the groups within the
11	state bring in new services and things like
12	that so they'd be able to bring a lot to the
13	table.
14	
15	COMMITTEE MEMBER: That's yeah,
16	that's a great idea.
17	
18	COMMITTEE MEMBER: Or even the
19	mothers against, you know, MADD and stuff
20	like that.
21	
22	MS. SHIPMAN: But again, this is
23	this is the challenge. I can't say it too
24	many times. And then, of course, the
25	citizen. And I think we kind of touched on

citizen with the community advocacy. It's a couple of things we talked about were having a trauma survivor or having a family member of a trauma survivor.

Or even a family member of someone who did not survive a trauma. But then you're talking about a very specific injury, which you don't -- so again, you don't want to limit the input from other people who may be doing something actively based on the injury.

So any -- but -- so any ideas for that that maybe we can talk about? Any ideas for that?

COMMITTEE MEMBER: A part of that,
I think, is how you pitch that to that
individual. Whether it's the trauma
survivor or if it's the community advocacy
-- I mean, undoubtedly there are 50
different community advocacy -- not groups,
there's hundreds of groups.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: But I mean, just 1 tracks of -- but if you -- if that -- that 2 person is understanding that -- that 3 community advocacy is a stakeholder in 4 violence and injury prevention. 5 And they are representing all 6 7 of those community groups, all of those different tracks. And I mean, that's a 8 9 weighty responsibility when you think. 10 But I mean, I think that's the intent of this is that -- she's the right 11 person. You get a lot of bang for your 12 buck. 13 14 15 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right. 16 That's true. 17 MS. SHIPMAN: That's Does -- so -- so I'll throw this out. 18 Does anyone have anybody in their -- because 19 this -- so we don't have to go through a 20 21 group thing, or an organization --22 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right. 23 24 Does anybody know of

MS. SHIPMAN:

anyone just right off the top of your head, 1 as a citizen, that you think would be 2 valuable to sit at the table as a voting 3 member? 4 5 COMMITTEE MEMBER: I don't like 6 7 that much. 8 9 MS. SHIPMAN: What's left? 10 COMMITTEE MEMBER: I mean, who we 11 deal with? I mean, that's the -- something 12 to think about. 13 14 MS. SHIPMAN: All right. Think 15 about somebody in your community who you see 16 doing injury prevention. So -- and not 17 necessarily from their job role, but just an 18 active parent or in the school systems. 19 Or just -- who is that person 20 21 in -- and the person that comes to mind in 22 our community is -- is probably Nancy Hahns [sp] who is the huge opioid epidemic pusher 23

keeps popping up and -- and is really

24

25

right now. So somebody like that that just

pushing for -- keep in mind the injury 1 prevention, not the clean-up after the mess. 2 3 But trying to keep us away from that. 4 There's always 5 COMMITTEE MEMBER: the frequent flyer patient. 6 7 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Loyal customer 8 9 certainly is. 10 COMMITTEE MEMBER: You are keeping 11 me employed. Loyal customer. 12 13 COMMITTEE MEMBER: That's good. 14 15 I will say that last 16 MS. SHIPMAN: one, the Office of the Chief Medical 17 Examiner, we've had some discussion on the 18 committee about what's the difference in 19 that and the epidemiologist. 20 So that is something that we 21 need to take back to TAG because it's really 22 fulfilling the same role. And we -- we 23 actually -- I think we were going to ask if 24 we could substitute something else. 25 But I

can go back and look at the minutes. so I'm not going to spend a lot of time on that, obviously, the CME because it's kind of redundant from talking about the epidemiologist, which our VDH representative, Lisa Luton, is going to calmly investigate an epidemiologist from VDH.

Any thoughts to help us decide who to reach out to -- you've had a lot of thoughts, I'm not saying that. But any other thoughts about who to reach out to?

This -- this is challenging. I mean, we're at --

COMMITTEE MEMBER: We're challenging the hero health.

MS. SHIPMAN: What we're talking about here, I just think, when we saw this list, we've had the same discussions. How are we going to -- how are we going to fill these positions? Because they're not hospital-based positions. They are community positions.

I think -- I COMMITTEE MEMBER: 1 think we can fill them. I think there are 2 3 people that are out there doing this kind of work that are interested. When we had our 4 first meeting locally, we had 50 individuals

show up.

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We met for three hours just to talk about some of the issues. And 40 minutes after the meeting ended, they were still talking in little groups.

They were -- and I haven't had any trouble with them showing up, so I think that these people -- there are people that are doing some incredible work.

That that's their life That's -- and they do it on their mission. off time. Some people are lucky enough it can be part of their job.

But a lot of them do it because they've lost a child, they've lost somebody in the community. And they're, you know, I'm thinking of -- there's a mom down in Tidewater who lost her son due to gun violence. And she started a non-profit group, that she's doing a lot of work. So

1 2

-- but you know, also sometimes people agree then -- then they sometimes have difficulty separating some of their thoughts when they -- when you put them in a group, they can kind of take over the group because it helps their pain.

But I think there are people out there. And I think you can get some people to be voting members and I think you can extend an invitation -- there are people that would feel -- be pleased to be welcome to just come and sit and listen and add.

So I think that, you know, I think we just need to pitch it both ways, you know. Do you want to be a voting member?

But if you, you know, if you don't -- can't see yourself as a voting member, but you'd like to be a part of the group and be welcome to come, I think you'll get some people.

MS. SHIPMAN: Well, why don't -- why don't we do this? Because we obviously have to come up with -- we're not going to

make decisions today. Why don't we -- those 1 of you who are here, please go back and 2 think about specific people to suggest. 3 Email me, don't email as a group because 4 that's considered a meeting. 5 You can't do that. It's the 6 7 rules. So email me with your suggestion and the organization that they would represent. 8 9 And let's start there -- and yes. 10 COMMITTEE MEMBER: The next meeting 11 is that -- we're all going to come together, 12 I think, May 2nd and 3rd? 13 14 Mm-hmm. 15 MS. SHIPMAN: 16 COMMITTEE MEMBER: So would you 17 like a time line on that or --18 19 MS. SHIPMAN: You know what? 20 21 Honestly, probably what we'll do is bring 22 the voting -- what we have right now as voting members, we'll -- we will meet before 23 then with your suggestions so that we can --24

25

because I can guarantee you we're going to

be charged tomorrow with what are you doing next? And it can't wait until May. So -- so what we'll do is the -- we'll -- we will meet so that we can have a quorum.

And we'll vote on who you submit, if that makes -- and that way when we meet in May, hopefully we'll have some of the people at the table that -- that you all suggest.

Any other comments, questions, suggestions? Okay. This is good. All right. Let's see. All right. Assignment of -- okay. So what's left to -- okay. We don't -- we don't have a quorum here to do some of these things.

So selection of a vice-chair, we will not be able to do that. Sara Beth is going to attend the -- the System

Improvement Committee tomorrow as our crossover. And we will table a vote on that later. Any public comment?

COMMITTEE MEMBER: Well, one of the things I think would be helpful and would come out of this group. It would be nice to

know what injury prevention programs are 1 being implemented. Because that would help 2 3 me from reinventing the wheel. If I could just pick up the phone and call you and say, 4 tell me what you're doing. 5 6 7 MS. SHIPMAN: Right. 8 9 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Would you -- do 10 you mind sharing some things. Then I replicate your program in my community. 11 Because I think that's one of the problems 12 for us. Everybody wants -- everybody ends 13 up creating something unique --14 15 MS. SHIPMAN: Uh-huh. 16 17 COMMITTEE MEMBER: -- they think is 18 unique. And then, you know, you get all 19 these different results. But if I just take 20 21 your program and replicate it and you replicate it also, that's powerful. 22 23 Yes. And that is one 24 MS. SHIPMAN:

of the goals of this committee.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: Okay.

MS. SHIPMAN: Is that we will eventually be able to have everything that's going on in the state and everyone know what's going on in the state, as opposed to this -- I'm going to use matter balance as a suggestion.

This group is doing matter balance here, this group is doing matter balance here but no one knows that the other one is doing it.

COMMITTEE MEMBER: Mm-hmm.

MS. SHIPMAN: Again, on Stop the Bleed. It was really interesting that Rachel brought that up. It doesn't really fall through here.

But the -- the disconnect because southwest Virginia reached out to central Virginia to come down to teach them Stop the Bleed. And I thought, well, I'm going to talk to Sara Beth and see what, you know, what -- if she wants to help. But I

talked to Sara Beth and she said, wait a 1 minute. We -- we've got this and this and 2 3 this. And we said, fine. 4 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Those are the 5 two gentlemen here? 6 7 MS. SHIPMAN: Oh, hi. Okay. 8 9 So it was -- you know, it was just 10 kind of, you know, knowing what each jurisdiction is doing so that we can -- so 11 that we know where the resources are, too. 12 13 COMMITTEE MEMBER: And how do we 14 15 share those resources. 16 COMMITTEE MEMBER: And what's 17 working, what's not working. 18 19 COMMITTEE MEMBER: 20 Yeah, absolutely. 21 22 COMMITTEE MEMBER: And that's up at 23 the statewide Safe Kids program. I mean, 24 there's a worldwide program. And there are 25

a coalition coordinators for childhood 1 injury prevention all across the state. And 2 3 -- and that just kind of going to just --4 COMMITTEE MEMBER: And how do we 5 know about what they're doing from a trauma 6 7 system committee and what's going on and having -- and that's why Corri from Safe 8 9 Kids is on the -- the committee. But being able to have that conversation and -- and 10 share those resources. 11 12 13 MS. SHIPMAN: So, yeah, that that is the goal. One of our goals. 14 15 It'd be good to 16 COMMITTEE MEMBER: 17 know what everybody's doing. 18 COMMITTEE MEMBER: Right. 19 20 21 COMMITTEE MEMBERS: You know, and yes, identifying injury patterns specific to 2.2. the areas and making sure that all the state 23 is covered. But you know, what is everybody 24

doing for injury prevention and what are you

seeing?

MS. SHIPMAN: And one of the other things that would be really nice for trauma centers is if we did something like, for example, we're trying to do in our area. September 21st of -- the first day of fall is Fall Prevention Day --

COMMITTEE MEMBER: Oh, yeah.

MS. SHIPMAN: -- for our geriatric patients. So if we kind of all just did something statewide in our -- in our localities, just on fall prevention.

And then, you know, if somehow it gets some PR out there so that -- so that people in the communities realize that it's fall prevention.

And we talk about the incidents of fall and how it impacts the elderly. And the things -- and where people fall most likely. And the things that you can do in your home. And if we all sent the same message, that would be pretty powerful

2	more and more is older people falling at
3	home.
4	
5	COMMITTEE MEMBERS: Oh, yes.
6	
7	MS. SHIPMAN: You know, that would
8	be that would be something that if we
9	could make it an annual something that comes
10	out of this group.

13	all y'all would be right. We'd all be
14	giving the same message, all with the same

17	MS. SHIPMAN: At the same time.

20	COMMITTEE MEMBER: And look very
