SUMMARY OF THE INFORMAL FACT-FINDING CONFERENCE

On June 2, 2004, the Notice of Informal Fact-Finding Conference ("Notice") was sent, via certified mail, to Anthony Farnella, Sr., President, Potomac Abatement, Inc. to the address of record. The Notice included the Informal Fact-Finding Conference Memorandum ("IFF Memorandum"), which contained the facts regarding the regulatory and/or statutory issues in this matter. The certified mail was signed for and received.

On July 15, 2004, Mr. Farnella called and requested the Informal Fact-Finding Conference ("IFF Conference") be rescheduled since he would be out of town that day. In addition, Mr. Farnella sent a fax letter requesting the IFF Conference be rescheduled.

On July 22, 2004, notification of rescheduling was mailed to Mr. Farnella to his address of record. The certified mail was signed for and received.

On August 19, 2004, the IFF Conference was convened at the Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation.

The following individuals participated at the IFF Conference: Anthony Farnella, Sr., Vice-President, Potomac Abatement, Inc., Respondent; Douglas Lasure, President, Potomac Abatement, Inc., Witness; Doug Schroder, Staff Member; and Richard Honeycutt, Presiding Board Member.

RECOMMENDATION

Based upon the evidence and the IFF Conference, the following is recommended regarding the Counts as outlined in the IFF Memorandum:

Count 1: Board Regulation (Effective January 2, 2002)

Potomac's felony convictions are a violation of Board Regulation 18 VAC 15-20-450.A.6. The operations manager for Potomac Abatement obtained a total of

fifty-nine (59) false training certificates for lead and asbestos workers and supervisors. The 59 certificates represented 880 hours of training fraudulently certified for Potomac employees. Of the 59 certificates, 19 were for *initial* training in asbestos/lead work and supervision. The remaining 40 fraudulent certificates were for refreshers. Because of the false certificates submitted to the Board by Potomac, licenses were issued to untrained asbestos supervisors and workers by the Commonwealth of Virginia.

In July of 2000, Potomac performed asbestos abatement and demolition work for Pan American in Washington, D.C. Forty-two (42) workers were without proper training. Potomac worked on other asbestos projects with false training certificates; two of which were in Virginia: Old Salem Village Apartments in Falls Church, and Richmond Plaza in Richmond.

During the IFF Conference, it was determined that Potomac had a small office staff (3 project managers, 1 operations manager, 1 assistant project manager, 1 warehouse manager, and 1 bookkeeper). A small office staff, all working in a central location, knew or should have known that something was amiss with the training.

During the IFF Conference, Farnella indicated that he received no complaints about the work done at the time in question, and that there was an independent industrial hygienist ("IH") monitoring the projects. However, Potomac did not present evidence to prove that an IH was on site during all aspects of all projects to ensure the safety of the public. Additionally, the IH may not have addressed the potential harm to the workers themselves if they were improperly trained. It is particularly concerning that approximately nineteen (19) of the fraudulent training certificates were for <u>initial</u> worker or supervisor training. During the IFF Conference, Farnella stated that Potomac employed approximately 80 workers and supervisors.

During the IFF Conference, Mr. Lasure described the operational and management changes put into place since the training issues came to light. The most significant change described was the reduction in staff. However, there are still no adequate checks and balances in place to ensure an employee is attending training rather than being at a job site.

Therefore, I recommend revocation of Potomac's asbestos contractor's license.

Count 2: <u>Board Regulation (Effective January 2, 2002)</u>

Potomac's failure to report the felony convictions to the Board within 30 days is a violation of Board Regulation 18 VAC 15-20-450.A.7. During the IFF Conference, Potomac indicated that none of the lawyers they had retained in connection with this matter had notified the Board of the conviction or Potomac of its responsibility

to report it. However, it is Potomac's responsibility to know the requirements of the Board's regulations and ensure its compliance with them. Therefore, I recommend that a monetary penalty of \$500.00 be imposed.

1. Violation of Board Regulation (Effective January 2, 2002)

18 VAC 15-20-450(A) (6)

FACTS:

On December 20, 2002, in the United States District Court Eastern District of Virginia, Alexanderia Division Potomac Abatement, Inc. was convicted of two counts of False Statements, a felony, in violation of 18 U.S.C..§ 1001 and 2. The court sentenced Potomac Abatement, Inc. to 5 years probation, a special assessment of \$800 and \$100,000 fine.

2. Violation of Board Regulation (Effective January 2, 2002)

18 VAC 15-20-450(A) (7)

FACTS:

On December 20, 2002, in the United States District Court Eastern District of Virginia, Alexanderia Division Potomac Abatement, Inc. was convicted of two counts of False Statements, a felony, in violation of 18 U.S.C..§ 1001 and 2. The court sentenced Potomac Abatement, Inc. to 5 years probation, a special assessment of \$800 and \$100,000 fine. Potomac Abatement, Inc. failed to notify the Board within 30 days of its conviction.
