ESTABLISHMENT OF A

QUORUM:

Ms. Hogue welcomed attendees and asked Ms. Stoll to take a roll call of Massage Therapy Advisory Board Members present. With three (3) members present, a

quorum was established.

Staff and public attendees were identified.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Ms. Bargdill announced that Annie Lively, L.M.T., was appointed to the Advisory

Board on Massage Therapy and that Ms. Peterson was re-appointed for a second term. Then, Ms. Bargdill announced that Candis Stoll started on July 10, 2023, as full-time Senior Licensing and Discipline Specialist, for the LMT, RMA and CNA programs, and Andrea Lewis started on June 19, 2023, as part-time Licensing

Specialist for Massage Therapy.

OLD BUSINESS: The minutes from the Advisory Board of Massage Therapy meeting, held on

November 9, 2022, were reviewed. There were no edits or corrections made to the minutes. Ms. Olivieri made a motion to accept the minutes. The motion was

seconded by Ms. Lively and carried unanimously.

Ms. Bargdill provided an update on the Interstate Massage Compact (Impact) and the model legislation that each state must enact to join the compact. In order for the

compact to be established, a total of seven states must enact the legislation. The most up-to-date information on IMpact and the model legislation can be found on the FSMTB website.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:** 

Ms. Hogue opened the meeting for public comment at 10:36 a.m. Ms. Bowers-Lanier addressed the Advisory Board on AMTA's current position on the model legislation and the Interstate Massage Therapy Compact.

**NEW BUSINESS:** 

Ms. Hogue announced that according to the By-laws, elections for both Chair and Vice-Chair must be held. Ms. Peterson is currently serving as Chair, and Ms. Hogue is serving as Vice-Chair. Both have served two consecutive terms each in their respective offices and therefore are ineligible to serve for another term, in accordance with the By-laws.

Ms. Olivieri moved to nominate herself to serve as Chair. The motion was seconded by Ms. Lively and carried unanimously. Ms. Olivieri then rescinded her nomination. Ms. Hogue moved to nominate herself as Chair and the motion was seconded by Ms. Lively. With no other nominees for Chair, Ms. Hogue was elected to Chair by acclamation.

Ms. Hogue moved to nominate Ms. Peterson to serve as Vice-Chair. The motion was seconded by Ms. Lively and carried unanimously. With no other nominees for Vice Chair, Ms. Peterson was elected to Vice Chair by acclamation.

Ms. Douglas reviewed the Formal Hearing schedule for January – December 2024, as well as Informal Conferences scheduled for January – June 2024. Advisory Board members will be polled so that they can provide their availability for Formal Hearings for 2024.

Comments related to current trends and issues in the massage therapy education and practice environments included a discussion on the U.S. Department of Education (D.O.E.) Title IV funding eligibility. D.O.E has revoked the 150% rule related to Title IV funding eligibility. The potential negative implications this could have on massage therapy candidates and schools was discussed.

**REPORTS:** 

Ms. Bargdill presented the L.M.T. Licensure Report. The number of L.M.T. licenses issued this year is on track with the number of licenses issued in 2022.

Ms. Bargdill presented the L.M.T. Discipline Report. There was a significant increase in discipline cases in comparison with previous years. This increase is primarily related to reporting of fraudulent massage therapy education resulting in the invalidation of the MBLEX exam results. Statistical reports provided are available in the agenda materials.

Ms. Bargdill attended and submitted a written report for the 2023 FSMTB Massage Board Executive Summit. She noted that this year the summit included an educational track for investigators. DHP Senior Investigator Kim Lynch attended the conference and participated in the programming available for investigators.

Ms. Hogue attended the 2023 FSMTB Annual Meeting and gave a verbal report. Topics from this meeting included sexual harassment of massage therapists by clients and the upcoming policy where massage therapy applicants must finish their course of instruction before applying to take the MBLEX.

#### **BYLAWS**

## THE ADVISORY BOARD ON MASSAGE THERAPY VIRGINIA BOARD OF NURSING

#### Article I - Members of the Advisory Board

The appointments and limitations of service of the members shall be in accordance with Section 54.1-3029.1 of the Code of Virginia.

#### **Article II - Officers**

Section 1. Titles of Officers - The officers of the advisory board shall consist of a chairman and a vice-chairman elected by the advisory board. The Deputy Executive Director of the Board of Nursing shall serve in an advisory capacity.

Section 2. Terms of Office - The chairman and the vice-chairman shall serve for a one-year term and may not serve for more than two consecutive terms in each office. The election of officers shall take place at the first meeting after July 1, and officers shall assume their duties immediately thereafter.

#### Section 3. Duties of Officers.

#### a. Chairman

- (1) The chairman shall preside at all meetings when present, make such suggestions as he may deem calculated to promote and facilitate its work, and discharge all other duties pertaining by law or by resolution of the advisory board. The chairman shall preserve order and conduct all proceedings according to and by parliamentary rules and demand conformity thereto on the part of the members.
- (2) The chairman shall appoint members of all committees as needed.
- (3) The chairman shall act as liaison between the advisory board and the Board of Nursing on matters pertaining to certification, discipline, legislation and regulation of massage therapy.

#### b. Vice-Chairman

The vice-chairman shall preside at meetings in the absence of the chairman and shall take over the other duties of the chairman as may be made necessary by the absence of the chairman.

#### **Article III - Meetings**

Section 1. There shall be at least one meeting each year in order to elect the chairman and vice-chairman and to conduct such business as may be deemed necessary by the advisory board.

Section 2. Quorum - Three members shall constitute a quorum for transacting business.

Section 3. Order of the Agenda - The order of the agenda may be changed at any meeting by a majority vote.

#### **Article IV - Amendments**

Amendments to these bylaws may be proposed by presenting the amendments in writing to all advisory board members prior to any scheduled advisory board meeting. If the proposed amendment receives a majority vote of the members present at that regular meeting, it shall be presented for consideration and vote to the Board of Nursing at its next regular meeting.

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is developing a national standard of practice for massage therapists employed by the VA's healthcare system to ensure consistent standards of care across all VA healthcare facilities. This means massage therapy



professionals will be expected to perform the same task and duties regardless of which state they are in. The standards enforced by the VA will preempt any state laws, rules or regulations that conflict with the task and duties authorized by the VA's national standards of practice.



#### Virginia Board of Nursing

#### **Guidance on Massage Therapy Practice**

#### Documentation of Training and Education:

If modalities of bodywork and specialized massage are incorporated into massage therapy practice, the Board of Nursing recommends that the Licensed Massage Therapist (LMT) maintain documentation of education and/or training in that area.

#### Appropriate Draping and Technique:

Areas that should be draped and not touched unless medically indicated for a condition referred by a physician, nurse practitioner or physician assistant and with the written informed consent of the client include: Anus, penis, testicles, scrotum, vagina, labia, clitoris, breast, nipples, and areola.

#### Consent:

Signed parental consent is recommended for massage therapy clients under the age of 18 years.

#### County/City Requirements:

A LMT should be knowledgeable about local/city requirements in which they practice.

Practice of Massage Therapy and use of title "massage therapist":

Pursuant to § 54.1-3000 of the Code of Virginia:

A "massage therapist" means a person who meets the qualifications specified in this chapter and who is currently licensed by the Board.

The practice of "Massage therapy" means the treatment of soft tissues for therapeutic purposes by the application of massage and bodywork techniques based on the manipulation or application of pressure to the muscular structure or soft tissues of the human body. The term "massage therapy" does not include the diagnosis or treatment of illness or disease or any service or procedure for which a license to practice medicine, nursing, midwifery, chiropractic, physical therapy, occupational therapy, acupuncture, athletic training, or podiatry is required by law or any service described in § 54.1-3001(18).

According to § 54.1-3008, it shall be a Class 1 misdemeanor for any person to:

Engage in the practice of massage therapy or hold himself out as practicing massage therapy unless he holds a license as a massage therapist issued by the Board.

- The Virginia Board of Nursing started accepting massage applications online as of April 2014
- Implementation of Licensure for Massage Therapist effective January 1, 2017 (from Certified Massage Therapist-CMT to Licensed Massage Therapist-LMT)
- Pursuant to Virginia Code 54.1-3005.1, the Virginia Board of Nursing incorporated both state and federal criminal background checks as part of the application process for Massage Therapist effective January 1, 2017. This requirement applies to applicants by initial application, endorsement, and reinstatement.
- Effective April 16, 2020, the Board of Nursing no longer provides official verification for licensees wishing to obtain out-of-state licensure. Licensees are directed to License Lookup.
- Effective September 30, 2020, pursuant to Virginia Code 54.1-3029, the Virginia Board of Nursing clarified the requirement for applicants to have **completed** a massage therapy program that is at least 500 hours and requires a Board-approved English-proficiency exam for applicants educated outside of the United States.

Re: Federation of State Massage Therapy Boards Executive Summit

Date: July 2, 2024

I attended the 2024 Federation of State Massage Therapy Boards (FSMTB) Executive Summit which was held April 3 – April 5, 2024 in Savannah, Georgia. The focus of the Executive Summit this year was on engagement and interaction between member Boards. Sessions included both panel discussions and presentations to foster movement towards uniformity and standardization of licensure activities across member Boards. Topics and takeaways from the meeting are detailed below.

Panel Discussion: Importance of and Need for Licensing Standardization and Uniformity facilitated by Christina Bargdill (VA) focused on exploring the feasibility and value of identifying common regulatory requirements and practices that cause variability in licensure processes and what elements of licensure and practice could be more uniform across jurisdictions. The group used the 2011 NCSBN Uniform Licensure Requirements document as an example of a process used by member organizations to consolidate thoughts and identify areas of agreement.

**Presentation:** Interstate Massage Compact (IMpact) Industry Panel and Myth Busting facilitated by Patty Glenn (FSMTB) included presentations by Industry Representative; Samantha Nance, Esq., Embry Merritt Womack Nance, PLLC to discuss the Interstate Massage Therapy Compact. Focus was on the benefits of participating in the licensing compact and to correct

misconceptions about the compact. To date only Nevada has passed legislation to join the compact. Seven states must pass legislation to join the compact to establish the compact.

**Presentation: FSMTB Programs, Services and Resources Overview** provided by FSMTB Board Members Liz Barnard (NV), Keith Warren (AL), Adrienne Price (GA) targeted a review of the resources available to FSMTB member organizations.

**Presentation:** Future of Regulation- Part 1: Cultural and Societal Context Professor W. Keith Campbell, University of Georgia provided a review of his research on generational differences and discussed the impact of covid, and how other recent events are shaping today's workforce and the regulatory environment.

**Presentation:** Future of Regulation- Part 2: Developing Strategies provided by Debra Persinger (FSMTB) highlighted FSMTB strategic initiatives, FSMTB's core values and the most pressing regulatory issues facing the profession.

**Presentation: Operation Nightingale and Fraud in Education** Eddie Calienes, Special Agent with the United States Department of Health and Human Services, OIG provided an overview of the investigations that identified the fraudulent nursing educational programs operating in Florida which grew into the multi-jurisdictional effort known as Operational Nightingale. Mr. Calienes provided examples of fraudulent transcripts and other documentation and practices that are relevant to the evaluation of educational documents for massage therapist applicants.

**Presentation:** The State of Massage Education – Identifying the Issues provided by Kevin Snedden (FSMTB) highlighted several emerging issues in massage therapy education, in addition to the concern about fraudulent programs and transcripts, to include program approvals without onsite visits, the recent DoE final rulemaking revoking the 150% rule impacting eligibility for financial aid, and a general increase in requests for offering testing in other languages and for accommodation for testing.

A Brainstorming session pertaining to The State of Massage Education was facilitated by Patty Glenn (FSMTB) and Mai Lin Petrine (FSMTB) to identify potential solutions to ensure the security and accessibility of the MBLEX exam.

FSMTB supports efforts to establish compatible requirements and cooperative procedures for the legal regulation of massage therapists in order to facilitate professional mobility and to simplify and standardize the licensing process. The Interstate Massage Compact (IMpact) provides an effective path towards meeting this goal.

Recently, AMTA and FSMTB met to discuss concerns pertaining to IMpact, leading to clarifications and intentions outlined in the joint letter below. The AMTA Board will further discuss the IMpact at its upcoming meeting on September 9-10 in Tampa, FL. FSMTB will continue to update our community as we continue these important conversations.





The Federation of State Massage Therapy Boards (FSMTB) represents the interests of state regulatory boards and agencies in protecting the public. The American Massage Therapy Association (AMTA) represents the interests of its members and the massage therapy profession overall.

The Council of State Governments (CSG) partnered with the Department of Defense (DoD) and FSMTB to support the mobility of licensed massage therapists through development of the Interstate Massage Compact (IMpact). AMTA and FSMTB are currently fielding questions about IMpact from many massage therapists. While all the answers are not yet known, we provide the following so that massage therapists can make informed decisions about IMpact.

#### **IMpact Commission Composition & Authority**

Although the IMpact legislation provides broad statutory language, an IMpact Commission will be formed to develop the specific rules and regulations governing massage therapists' ability to get a Multistate license. Because the IMpact Commission is not yet formed, it is unclear what the Commission would accept or allow.

What we know is that the IMpact Commission will be made up of the same people who oversee the existing state massage licensing boards and will likely be a subset of FSMTB members. Based on the IMpact development process and recommendations from subject matter experts, we are conveying the intention of the IMpact language in two key areas: education and licensing examination.

#### **Examples of Qualifying Education**

IMpact language Article 4.A.2.: To qualify for a Multistate License under this Compact, and to maintain eligibility for such a license, an applicant must: Have completed at least six hundred and twenty-five (625) clock hours of Massage Therapy education or the substantial equivalent which the Commission may approve by Rule.

For a State: The regulatory requirement for a State to be able to participate in the IMpact is that the State requires massage therapy education. The topics covered and the number of hours that the state requires is not specified. What matters is that initial and continuing massage education must be required for a massage therapist to get and maintain a massage license in a participating State.

For a massage therapist: What matters for the massage therapist is that the individual LMT (i) must be licensed in a State that is participating in IMpact and (ii) must have at least 625 hours of massage education. The average entry-level massage education program offered in the United States today is in excess of the 625 hour requirement. We also know that some LMTs graduated from a massage therapy education program with less than 625 hours and that others were able to bypass education hours requirements adopted by their state after they started practicing ("grandfathered").

The language in Article 4.A.2 that says "or the substantial equivalent" is intended to allow the IMpact Commission to include and accommodate LMTs whose core massage education was less than 625 hours, with the intention that the core education can be supplemented with continuing education.

Example 1: If you went to a 500-hour massage program, you would need to provide proof that you have completed 125 hours of continuing education to meet the 625 hours of education requirement, even if you have been a practicing massage therapist for 5, 10, 20 or more years, before qualifying for a Multistate license.

Example 2: If you went to a 600-hour massage program, and you have not completed any continuing education but you have been in practice for several years, you still would need to provide proof that you have completed 25 additional hours of education to meet the 625 hours of education requirement before qualifying for a Multistate license.

#### **Examples of Qualifying Licensing Examination**

IMpact language Article 4.A.3.: To qualify for a Multistate License under this Compact, and to maintain eligibility for such a license, an applicant must: Have passed a National Licensing Examination or the substantial equivalent which the Commission may approve by Rule.

For a massage therapist, the fact that a particular examination is not specifically named in the IMpact statutory language is intentional.\* Article 2.U. defines a National Licensing Examination as a national exam developed by a national association of Massage Therapy regulatory boards, and the exam meets testing and security standards. The current licensing examination adopted by the majority of states for entry into the profession is the Massage & Bodywork Licensing Examination (MBLEx), which satisfies the National Licensing Examination definition. However, we know that many LMTs took an exam for licensure before the MBLEx existed or before their State adopted the MBLEx.

The language in Article 4.A.3 that says "or the substantial equivalent" is intended to allow the IMpact Commission to include and accommodate LMTs who may have taken a different national exam in the past, such as those offered by the National Certification Board for Therapeutic Massage and Bodywork (NCBTMB). In all cases, the state in which you are licensed must have adopted IMpact.

Example 1: If you went to massage school and then took the NESL, NCETM, or NCETMB offered by the NCBTMB for licensure, then under the provision of "or the substantial equivalent" you would be eligible for the Multistate License without taking another exam.

Example 2: If you went to massage school and did *not* take a national exam but were licensed in one of the following ways, you would *not* meet the "or the substantial equivalent" requirement:

- You took a state practical exam to become licensed
- You took a state exam for licensure
- You were licensed by your state based on years in practice and did not take an exam
- You were grandfathered into licensure

In each case, your only options would be to (i) avoid the IMpact and apply for each state license individually or (ii) take the MBLEx or a substantial equivalent to be eligible for the Multistate License.

\*Note that the regulatory requirement for a State to be able to participate in the IMpact is that the State must accept passage of the MBLEx for licensure.



## **MBLEx**®

FSMTB's flagship program, the Massage & Bodywork Licensing Examination (MBLEx) was developed by the profession, for the profession, to meet the needs of the regulatory community as a requisite component of the licensure process.

The exam is psychometrically sound and legally defensible, and is designed to measure the entry level competence of new professionals with the safety of the consuming public at its core. The exam program continues to benefit from dedicated subject matter experts who volunteer their time to write content, staff and testing experts who put hours into the development process, and Member Boards who insist on using a licensing exam that is a product of integrity in design and implementation. FSMTB continues to work with Member Boards and agencies, as well as law enforcement, to protect the exam and, in turn, the licensure process.

## MBLEX TESTING ACCOMMODATIONS

The FSMTB provides testing accommodations for qualified candidates with diagnosed disabilities in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. The costs for providing testing accommodations are covered entirely by FSMTB.

The nature of the disabilities for which the accommodations were provided included ADHD, learning disabilities, dyslexia, visual/hearing impairments, and mental health conditions.

FSMTB offers online CE courses sponsored by state boards through the Regulatory Education and Competence Hub (REACH) at reach4ce.org. Course completion information is recorded in the Massage Therapy Licensing Database (MTLD) for participating state boards to access.

#### **CE REGISTRY**

CE Registry is a registry of educators, providing massage and bodywork therapy continuing education, who meet and adhere to the national CE standards developed by the FSMTB regulatory community. The CE Registry accepts information from continuing education providers, including course completion information, and transfers that information into the national Massage Therapy Licensing Database (MTLD).

CE Registry includes a Course Search capability that allows potential CE consumers (LMTs) to search for courses that meet their needs.

## CE Registry is a solution that meets the needs of the regulatory community by:

- 1. Verifying primary source documentation of completed CE in MTLD
- 2. Supporting the authority of state regulatory boards to accept CE for license renewal
- 3. Reducing the instances of CE fraud among licensees
- Protecting the licensees from predatory practices by CE providers
- Identifying and exposing providers who are not compliant with the standards established by the FSMTB membership

# GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

We also tracked a number of anti-human trafficking bills and bills updating the massage therapy practice act including areas on scope of practice, moral turpitude, and criminal background checks.


### **BILLS**

## MASSAGE THERAPY LICENSING DATABASE

The Massage Therapy Licensing Database is a vital component of the FSMTB's mission to simplify and standardize the licensure process and a key component of the IMpact. A state's participation in MTLD makes the task of validating application information more efficient. State board/agency administrative staff can search MTLD to quickly find therapist information anywhere in the United States using simple search methods. This eliminates the need to search multiple websites for current license status of applicants, saves time, and is a practical solution to ensure accurate vetting of licensure applicants.

# MASSAGE BOARD EXECUTIVE SUMMIT

The 2024 Massage Board Executive Summit was held in Savannah, Georgia, on April 4-5. This year, we invited massage board attorneys to attend along with their board's executive director.

Guest speakers included Dr. W. Keith Campbell, a psychology professor from the University of Georgia, who discussed generational differences and evolving cultural and societal trends resulting from changing demographics and their impact on educational expectations, standards, and uniformity. A Special Agent from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services-Office of Inspector General, shared his experience with Operation Nightingale, the nursing diploma scam that has affected over 7.000 nurses who used fraudulent education credentials to obtain a nursing license. Samantha Nance, Esq., from Embry Merritt Womack Nance, PLLC, also spoke regarding the Interstate Massage Compact, dispelling myths and misinformation and answering questions from attendees.

Attendees also had many opportunities to network and learn from each other.

## VIRTUAL MEMBERSHIP EVENTS

Virtual Membership Events support the mission of the FSMTB by facilitating communication among member boards and providing education and guidance on topics related to massage therapy regulation. Topics addressed in 2024 included the Interstate Massage Compact, the Entry Level Analysis Project, State of Massage Education, Regulatory Trends and Continuing Competence. These events present an opportunity for members to discuss issues across jurisdictions and learn from one another.

#### **ANNUAL MEETING**
