Deficites of the Proposed Changes (Primary Option)
Chapter 628 of the 2022 Acts of Assembly required that the Board of
Pharmacy adopt emergency regulations related to work environments for
pharmacy personnel to protect the health, safety, and welfare of patients.
The Board amended a section of Chapter 20 and added a new section to
address the issued raised by Chapter 628. These proposed regulations
offer a few changes to the emergency regulations currently in place, none
of which significantly alter any economic analysis from the previous
regulations.

This action would have the greatest potential cost on pharmacies, including chain pharmacies, although these regulations do not directly require any costs. Pharmacies would need to hire additional staff if their pharmacies are inadequately staffed, which would incur a cost. Those costs are related to complying with basic standards of care, however, not complying with regulation, and should not be included in this assessment. There would be a small administrative cost for pharmacies to keep staffing records on board provided forms, however these costs are negligible and the board is allowing the use of an electronic form as well, potentially eliminating this cost entirely.

There are no monetary benefits considered for this action, however there is general benefit for the individuals whom this action will affect, specifically pharmacists and pharmacy technicians who would benefit from improved working conditions.
