A. Reportable Disease List.

The board declares the following named diseases, toxic effects, and conditions to be reportable by the persons enumerated in 12 VAC 5-90-90. Conditions listed in capital and bold letters require rapid communication, as defined in subsection B of this section:

Acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS)	Malaria

Arboviral infection (<u>e.g., EEE, LAC, SLE, WNV</u>)	Mumps

Giardiasis	<u>Smallpox</u>
Gonorrhea	Streptococcal disease, Group A, invasive
Granuloma inguinale	<u>Streptococcus pneumoniae</u> , invasive if <5 years of age
HAEMOPHILUS INFLUENZAE INFECTION, INVASIVE	Syphilis (report PRIMARY and SECONDARY syphilis by rapid means)
Hantavirus pulmonary syndrome	Tetanus
Hemolytic uremic syndrome (HUS)	Toxic shock syndrome
Hepatitis, Acute Viral	Toxic substance related illnesses
HEPATITIS A (IgM +)	Trichinosis
Hepatitis B:	TUBERCULOSIS DISEASE
<u>Acute disease (IgM +)</u>	Tuberculosis infection in children age <4 years (Mantoux skin test reaction \geq 10 mm)
<u>HBsAg positive pregnant woman</u>	<u>Tularemia</u>
Hepatitis C (<u>acute and chronic</u>)	Typhoid fever
Other Acute Viral Hepatitis	Typhus
<u>Hepatitis, Other Acute Viral</u>	<u>Unusual occurrence of disease of public health concern</u>
Human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection	Vancomycin-resistant <i>Staphylococcus aureus</i>
Influenza	<i>Vibrio</i> infection
Kawasaki syndrome	<u>Viral hemorrhagic fever</u>
Lead - elevated blood levels	YELLOW FEVER
