The State Water Control Board is amending the existing Virginia Pollution Abatement (VPA) General Permit Regulation for Poultry Waste Management in order to reissue the permit regulation. The VPA General Permit Regulation for Poultry Waste Management governs the management of poultry feeding operations which confine 200 or more animal units (20,000 chickens or 11,000 turkeys), and establishes utilization, storage, tracking and accounting requirements related to poultry waste, including that transferred from poultry feeding operations. The general permit first became effective on December 1, 2000. The permit term was ten years, thus it is due to expire on November 30, 2010.

In 1999, the Virginia General Assembly passed House Bill 1207 (62.1-44.17:1.1) establishing the Virginia Poultry Waste Management Program. The Act required the State Water Control Board develop a regulatory program governing the storage, treatment and management of poultry waste including dry waste. Virginia Code § 62.1-44.17:1.1 authorizes the State Water Control Board to establish and implement the Poultry Waste Management Program. The program established provisions for issuing general permits to confined poultry feeding operations. The general permit became effective on December 1, 2000. As of January 1, 2010 amendments establishing requirements for proper storage, land application and recordkeeping for end-users of poultry waste became effective.

The purpose of this action is to reissue the existing Virginia Pollution Abatement (VPA) General Permit for Poultry Waste Management. The current VPA general permit expires on November 30, 2010.

The primary advantage of the proposed regulatory action is the reissuance of the regulation which will allow for confined poultry feeding operations to be covered under the general permit. The permit contains provisions appropriate for the protection of state waters, and the general permit process allows for protection of water quality with minimum agency resources related to the issuance of the permit. This is an advantage for the public, the regulated community, as well as the Commonwealth. There are no disadvantages of the proposed regulatory action.

There are no applicable federal requirements for confined poultry feeding operations that do not discharge or propose to discharge. The Virginia Pollution Abatement General Permit Regulation for Poultry Waste Management is a state program with requirements included in the regulation necessary to meet state statutory requirements.

It is not anticipated that the reissuance of this regulation will cause any economic impacts in the Commonwealth.

Currently, 894 confined poultry feeding operations are covered under this general permit. One alternative to the reissuance of the VPA General Permit for Poultry Waste Management is to issue coverage under an individual VPA permit to each poultry feeding operation which confines 200 or more animal units. However, due to the number of confined poultry feeding operations currently required to obtain coverage under a VPA permit, it is not practical to issue coverage to each operation under an individual VPA permit. Operations that do not qualify for coverage under the general permit will be issued coverage under an individual VPA permit.

Regulatory flexibility analysis

The regulation includes authorization for coverage under the general permit as well as establishes the utilization, storage, tracking and accounting requirements related to poultry waste. The use of the general permit is the alternative to issuing coverage under an individual Virginia Pollution Abatement (VPA) permit. Compliance with the technical requirements is an alternative for poultry waste brokers and endusers to requiring coverage under the general permit or an individual VPA permit.

Public comment

Written comments were submitted by 4 organizations: all were in support of the reissuance of this permit regulation. The comments are provided in the preceding pages. Agency Response to NOIRA Comments: all of the comments received for the NOIRA were provided to the members of the Regulatory Advisory Panel for consideration during the draft regulation development process.

The current VPA general permit, set to expire November 30, 2010, conforms to the intent of the authorizing legislation. The Department of Environmental Quality has successfully operated and achieved a very high rate of program compliance among permitted poultry operations. Given the levels of producer program compliance and industry support for assisting producers and the state in managing poultry waste, we oppose additional requirements that unduly burden permitted producers in the reissue of the existing VPA General Permit for Poultry Waste Management. Action to modify the current Virginia Pollution Abatement Permit Regulation for Poultry Waste Management is underway in a prior and separate effort. The proposed amendments would extend the regulatory authority to end-users of poultry waste. Pending the outcome of the proposal to amend the regulation in this prior ongoing action, we reserve additional comment on this action to reissue the regulation. We believe that any Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) established to advise the agency on the regulatory proposal include permitted poultry growers from across the state. The TAC should also include poultry waste brokers and end-users in the event the regulation is extended to these individuals. Virginia Farm Bureau has been involved with this regulation since its genesis and would appreciate an opportunity for a member of our staff to participate on this TAC as well.	Wayne F. The Council would urge DEQ to reissue the VPA General Permit for Poultry Waste Management in its current form. Our members in the poultry industry have come into compliance with the provisions of this regulation, and believe that the permit requirements, inspections, and enforcement provisions of the regulation are adequate. In addition, with proposed changes to the VPA Permit Regulation for End-Users of Poultry Litter currently undergoing public comment prior to final consideration by the State Water Control Board, we believe that making substantial changes to another part of this regulation at this time is not necessary. The provisions of the current law provide for environmental protections on poultry operations and meet the statutory requirements of the law. If a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) should be formed during the process of reissuing or amending this regulation, the Virginia Agribusiness Council would like to request that a representative be included as a member of the TAC. Shenandoah Riverkeeper urges the State Water Control Board to re-issue this permit which is critical both to safegaurding state waters from pollution that has long been documented to occur with unregulated use of poultry waste (litter), and to satisfy requirements of House Bill 1207 and corresponding Virginia Code Prior to regulatory guidance, the record demonstrates that the farming community used poultry litter in a menner that may have been effective at growing pasture, hay and row crops but was not protective of state waters. For consistency, I would like to submit the same arguments for the re-issuance of this permit as I have for the necessity of regulating the brokering and end-user community. These arguments apply to litter use on the farm of origin and off. Section I of Article XI of Virginia's Constitution reads that "it shall be the Commonwealth's policy to protect its atmosphere, lands, and waters from pollution, impairment, or destruction, for the benefit, enjoyment, and general welfare of the people of the Commonwealth." Nearly a decade ago, The Commonwealth's House Bill 1207 and its subsequent regulations were an important first step in addressing the pollution problems associated with decades of over-application of poultry waste on agricultural lands. Shenandoah Riverkeeper contends that these problems are thoroughly documented, and have been the subject of intense scientific study and scrutiny for more than a decade. We also contend that the current regulations are not protective of our land and our state waters and that the proposed changes in the regulation are imperative if we are to begin to turn around the over-nutrification problems in the Shenandoah Valley and in the Chesapeake Watershed. The Shenandoah Riverkeeper's mission is to "Use citizen action and enforcement to protect and restore water quality in the Shenandoah Valley for people, fish and aquatic life".
