The Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services is authorized to adopt regulations establishing a fee structure for the licensure, registration, and certification of pesticide applicators and businesses. These fees defray the costs of implementing the Virginia Pesticide Control Act (Act). The proposed action seeks to lower the fees for commercial applicator certifications, pesticide business licenses, and registered technician certifications. This action is expected to be noncontroversial. Current budget projections allow for the lowering of these fees while continuing to defray the cost of implementing the Act.

"Board" means the Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

"Commercial applicator" means any person who has completed the requirements for certification to use or supervise the use of any pesticide for any purpose or on any property other than as provided in the definition of private applicator found in Va. Code § 3.2-3900.

"Registered technician" means an individual who has satisfactorily completed the Board requirements for certification to apply general use pesticides, and to apply restricted use pesticides while under the direct supervision of a certified commercial applicator. Registered technicians render services similar to those of a certified commercial applicator, but have not completed all the requirements to be eligible for certification as a commercial applicator.

"Pesticide business" means any person engaged in the business of: distributing, applying or recommending the use of a product; or storing, selling, or offering for sale pesticides directly to the user. The term "pesticide business" does not include: (i) wood treaters not for hire; (ii) seed treaters not for hire; (iii) operations that produce agricultural products, unless the owners or operators of such operations described in clauses (i), (ii), and (iii) are engaged in the business of selling or offering for sale pesticides, or distributing pesticides to persons outside of that agricultural producing operation in connection with commercial transactions; or (iv) businesses exempted by regulations adopted by the Board.

"VDACS" means the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

"Virginia Pesticide Control Act" means Chapter 39 of Title 3.2 of the Code of Virginia (Va. Code § 3.2-3900 et seq.).

On March 21, 2024, the Board authorized staff to take any and all steps necessary to amend 2 VAC 5-675, Regulations Governing Pesticide Fees Charged by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, to lower the fees for commercial applicator certifications, pesticide business licenses, and registered technician certifications.

The impetus for the change was the Board's review of the current pesticide fee structure to determine if current fees provide adequate funding for VDACS's pesticide program. The Board determined that the current fee structure generated more revenue than was necessary to administer the Act, which would continue to increase the program's cash balance, and that reducing the fees would be an appropriate

measure. The fee structure was last amended March 17, 2022. At that time, the Board directed VDACS to reconvene the Regulatory Advisory Panel every two years to evaluate the fee structure and to determine if additional changes to the fee structure are necessary.

The proposed amendments lower the fees for commercial applicator certifications, pesticide business licenses, and registered technician certifications and, as such, are expected to be noncontroversial and appropriate for the fast-track process.

Section 3.2-109 of the Code of Virginia (Code) establishes the Board as a policy board with the authority to adopt regulations in accordance with the provisions of Title 3.2 of the Code.

Section 3.2-3906(7) of the Virginia Pesticide Control Act (Act) authorizes the Board to adopt regulations establishing a fee structure for licensure, registration, and certification to defray the costs of implementing the Act.

Purpose

The agency has determined that current fees provide more than adequate funding for implementation of VDACS's pesticide program. The fees prescribed in 2 VAC 5-675 are utilized to operate VDACS's pesticide programs, which protect human health and the environment by ensuring the proper use of pesticides used to control pests that adversely affect crops, structures, health, and domestic animals. Pesticide program activities include the certification of approximately 22,600 pesticide applicators, the licensing of approximately 3,000 pesticide businesses, the registration of approximately 16,000 pesticide products, and conducting routine inspections and investigations. VDACS is able to ensure compliance with all applicable laws and regulations related to the use of pesticides, thereby protecting human health, while lowering the fees for commercial applicator certifications, pesticide business licenses, and registered technician certifications, which will support the economic welfare of the businesses currently responsible for paying these fees.

The proposed amendments will lower the fees for (i) commercial applicator certifications from \$100 to \$25, (ii) commercial applicator certification reexaminations from \$100 to \$25, (iii) additional categories or subcategories for commercial applicator certifications from \$35 to \$25, (iv) registered technician certifications from \$50 to \$25, (v) registered technician certification reexaminations from \$50 to \$25, and (vi) annual pesticide business licenses from \$150 to \$75.

The proposed regulatory action is advantageous to the public and to the regulated industry because the proposed action will reduce the costs to pesticide applicators and pesticide businesses while allowing VDACS's pesticide program to continue protecting public health and the environment. Lowering the pesticide applicator fees and business license fees does not add any additional regulatory requirements for pesticide applicators or pesticide businesses. There are no disadvantages to the public or the Commonwealth.

In addition, outreach to the regulated industry regarding the proposed fee change would be incorporated into existing communications and outreach opportunities. The proposed amendments will result in an annual nongeneral fund revenue loss of approximately \$450,000; however, the long-term projection is that the revenue collected under the adjusted fee structure will be sufficient to carry out the program's mission.

Alternatives to the proposed regulatory action include no changes to the fees, or increasing, decreasing, or eliminating fees for pesticide business licenses or pesticide product registration. The Pesticide Fee Regulatory Advisory Panel created by the Board recommended lowering the fees associated with commercial applicator certifications, pesticide business licenses, and registered technician certifications applicator renewals as the best option. If no changes are made to the fees, VDACS's pesticide program funds would be significantly greater than the cost to carry out the mission of the program. Elimination of the fees or additional decreases to other pesticide-related fees would result in the program being underfunded in the coming years.

Pesticides are used for the control of pests that adversely affect crops, structures, human health, and domestic animals. Pesticides can also cause harm because they are designed to prevent, destroy, repel, or mitigate pests. Given the risk associated with the application of pesticides to both human health and the environment, the use of pesticides is highly regulated at the federal and state level. VDACS's pesticide programs protect human health and the environment by ensuring the proper use of pesticides. These programs include the certification of pesticide applicators, the licensing of pesticide businesses, the registration of pesticide products, and inspections and investigations to ensure compliance with all applicable laws and regulations. Exemptions, less stringent requirements, or a reduction in the services provided by VDACS would not provide adequate protection for human health and the environment. The proposed regulatory action seeks to reduce the fees paid by industry, thereby minimizing the adverse impacts to businesses. The proposed amendments ensure adequate funding to continue to carry out program services.
