Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly requires the Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services (Board) to adopt a regulation governing the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop and establishes specific provisions this regulation must include. As required by Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly, the proposed regulation requires a regulated person or facility to register with the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS). This regulation also establishes standards of adequate care, exercise, feed, shelter, space, treatment, water, proper cleaning, and lighting. This regulation requires at least one unannounced inspection by the State Animal Welfare Inspector annually. Finally, the regulation establishes remedies for each finding in a given inspection.

Acronyms and Definitions

This regulatory action was mandated by Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly.

Section 3.2-109 of the Code of Virginia (Code) establishes the Board as a policy board.

Section 3.2-6501.1 of the Code, which was established by Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly, requires the Board to adopt a regulation for the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop.

Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly requires the Board to adopt a regulation for the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop. The general welfare of the public is protected when regulations are promulgated in compliance with statutory requirements. The goal of the statutory and regulatory requirements is to standardize welfare requirements for dogs and cats sold by retail pet shops.

Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly requires the Board to adopt a regulation governing the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop and establishes specific provisions this regulation must include. Chapter 1284 requires that the regulation require a regulated person or facility to register with VDACS. The regulation must also establish standards of adequate care, exercise, feed, shelter, space, treatment, water, proper cleaning, and lighting. The regulation must require at least one unannounced inspection by the State Animal Welfare Inspector annually. Finally, the regulation must establish remedies for each finding in a given inspection.

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Issues

Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly requires the Board to adopt a regulation governing the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop and establishes specific provisions this regulation must include. Identifying potential requirements has proven to be a contentious issue for the interested stakeholders. The regulation will affect pet shops, which will be regulated by VDACS. Certain pet shops that are currently in operation may not be in compliance with the requirements or may incur increased costs in order to come into compliance with the requirements.

The regulation will also affect VDACS, which will be responsible for ensuring compliance with the requirements established in the new regulation. A VDACS inspector will inspect all pet shops for compliance with Virginia's Comprehensive Animal Care Law, and, once the proposed regulation becomes effective, the inspector will inspect for compliance with the regulation's requirements as well.

The promulgation of this regulation is required by Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly. This regulation will have minimal adverse impact on small businesses. A pet shop that sells dogs or cats will be required to pay a registration fee of \$250 and be inspected by VDACS staff.
