The purpose of this proposed action is to amend the current regulations (12VAC5-481) ensuring their compatibility with Title 10, Energy, of the Code of Federal Regulations. Agreement States are required to ensure their regulations are compatible with Title 10 regulations. This revision will ensure that Virginia's regulations implement revisions that were performed by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) in 2015. These revisions are required to be implemented by the Agreement States within 3 years of implementation by the NRC; that is, January 16, 2018 for the most restrictive NRC change requirement. The changes to Virginia's Radioactive Materials Regulations are to accommodate the NRC's regulatory changes related to reportable safety events involving special nuclear material; to remove the Safeguards Information – Modified

Handling (SGI-M) designation of the security-related information for large irradiators, manufacturers and distributors, and for transport of category 1 quantities of radioactive material; to make updates for the packaging and transportation of radioactive material based on the International Atomic Energy Agency's 2009 standards for the international transportation of radioactive material and to maintain consistency with the DOT's regulations, and to make miscellaneous corrections that include correcting references, typographical errors and misspellings.

This action also resolves the one NRC comment submitted to the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) in their letter of March 22, 2017 following their review of VDH's most recent regulation changes; that is, Virginia needs to replace "Director, Office of Federal and State Materials and Environmental Management Programs" with "Director, Office of Nuclear Material Safety and Safeguards" in the regulations.

The State Health Commissioner, Dr. Marissa Levine, approved these amendments to the Virginia Radiation Protection Regulations (12VAC5-481) on behalf of the State Board of Health on July 31, 2017.
