(1) Relevant Laws

§ 54.1-201.5 of the Code of Virginia states that the Board has the power and duty "To promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) necessary to assure continued competency, to prevent deceptive or misleading practices by practitioners and to effectively administer the regulatory system administered by the regulatory board. The regulations shall not be in conflict with the purposes and intent of this chapter or of Chapters 1 (§ 54.1-100 et seq.) and 3 (§ 54.1-300 et seq.) of this title.

<u>§ 54.1-404.A</u> of the *Code of Virginia* authorizes the board as follows: "The Board shall promulgate regulations not inconsistent with this chapter governing its own organization, the professional qualifications of applicants, the requirements necessary for passing examinations in whole or in part, the proper conduct of its examinations, the implementation of exemptions from license requirements, and the proper discharge of its duties."

The imperative form of the verb "shall" is used, making the Board's authority to regulate mandatory rather than discretionary. Executive Order 17 (2014) states, in part, "Each existing regulation in the state shall be reviewed at least once every four years by the promulgating agency unless specifically exempted from periodic review by the Governor."

No viable alternative has been identified. The current regulations establish minimum requirements for the certification of wetland delineators. The regulations establish requirements for a certificate program (not a licensure program); therefore, the regulations do not affect the practice of wetland delineation by non-certified individuals.

### Effectiveness

The regulations are consistent with the criteria of Executive Order 17 (2014) in that they are necessary for the establishment of minimum standards for certification but do not preclude the practice of wetland delineation by non-certified individuals.

The current regulations establish minimum requirements for the certification of wetland delineators; however, because the regulations establish requirements for a certificate program (not a licensure program), the regulations do not affect the practice of wetland delineation by non-certified individuals.

2. Although no comments were received online; three comments were sent to the Board. The first comment is a statutory requirement. The second comment is already prohibited by statute. The last comment is in support of retaining the regulations in their current form.

3. The regulations are not complex in nature.

4. The regulations do not overlap, duplicate, or conflict with federal or state laws or regulations but instead work in concert with them.

5. The last periodic review concluded January, 2012. There were further changes to the regulations that became effective March 1, 2015.

No small business impact has been identified.
