Section 62.1-44.15 of the Code of Virginia authorizes the State Water Control Board to adopt regulations to enforce the general water quality management program. The Ground Water Standards are a state regulation and there is no equivalent corresponding federal regulation. Groundwater standards are not

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mandated by the Clean Water Act, and there is no EPA review or approval of groundwater standards. The regulation establishes groundwater standards that prevent the degradation of groundwater quality. Groundwater is a primary source of drinking water for thousands of Virginians with individual homeowner wells and for 757 municipal public water supplies. High quality groundwater is the source of supply for 158 manufacturing facilities in Virginia that rely on water that requires minimal treatment.

The State Water Control Board previously amended this regulation in 2004. The previous periodic review occurred in 2018.

Alternatives to Regulation

The Department considered the alternative of repealing the regulation but determined that the regulation is still needed to protect public safety, health, and welfare. The Department also considered the alternative of amending the regulation, but determined that no amendments are necessary at this time.

Commenter Melinda White (via Town Hall)	As a resident who has always had access to well water in Virginia from Lee County, Wise County, Washington County and now Powhatan County and now Powhatan County, water quality and its assurance is vital. I have experienced well water near coal mining that required expensive filters to be potable. Now within shouting distance of a proposed landfill, I cannot overstate the need for heavy regulation to protect residences. Once our water quality is ruined, we are in serious and expensive trouble.	Agency response The Department determined that the regulation protects the public health, safety and welfare through groundwater standards that prevent the degradation of groundwater quality. The comment supports this conclusion.

Groundwater is a primary source of drinking water for thousands of Virginians with individual homeowner wells and for 757 municipal public water supplies. High quality groundwater is the source of supply for 158 manufacturing facilities in Virginia that rely on water that requires minimal treatment.

The current regulation continues to be needed. This regulation establishes groundwater standards to protect the quality of groundwater in the Commonwealth. The one public comment received during the periodic review comment period was generally supportive of regulation to protect groundwater quality from pollution.

The regulation establishes groundwater standards that are statewide, as well as specific standards that are applicable in the different physiographic provinces in the Commonwealth. This regulation is a stateonly regulation, and these standards do not overlap, duplicate, or conflict with federal or state law or regulation.

This regulation was last amended in 2004. The last periodic review occurred in 2018. The groundwater standards in this regulation continue to be protective of groundwater quality with limited regulatory burden.

The regulation establishes groundwater standards and does not directly impact small businesses.
