Equine infectious anemia (EIA) is a chronic viral disease of all members of the equine family (horses, mules, asses, etc.). No vaccine is available to prevent the disease and there is no known cure. The virus is spread from infected to healthy horses by biting flies or contaminated instruments such as hypodermic needles - rather than by direct horse-to-horse contact. Protection of healthy horses can come only by isolating or removing infected animals since they remain carriers of the virus for life. Regulatory identification and control of horses infected with EIA is highly desirable in preventing and controlling this disease in the equine population of Virginia.

This regulation establishes the testing requirements for EIA that equines must meet when assembling at a public gathering, sale or auction in Virginia. The regulation states that the

person in charge of a public event is responsible for the administration of the testing requirement, and further states that the person in charge will exclude any horse not accompanied by a negative test report. Finally the regulation provides specific requirements for the disposition of positive reactors to the test.

Basis

Sections 3.1-724 through 3.1-730 of the Code of Virginia (1950), as amended, require the Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services, the State Veterinarian, and all other veterinarians within the Commonwealth to use their best efforts to protect the domestic animals and poultry from disease. Consequently, the Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services and the State Veterinarian shall establish rules and regulations to prevent the entry of animal diseases and to establish livestock and poultry disease surveillance, control, and eradication programs to prevent the possible interstate and subsequent statewide spread of diseases.

The Department published its notice in The Virginia Register of Regulations on September 11, 2000, advertising the opportunity to comment on this regulation pursuant to Executive Order Twenty-five (98). An informal advisory group was not formed for the purpose of assisting in this periodic review.

The Department received no public comment on this regulation review during the comment period.

Effectiveness

The specific and measurable goals of the regulation are:

1. The protection of the horse industry with the least possible cost and intrusiveness.

2. To prevent or minimize the introduction of contagious and infectious diseases into animal populations in the Commonwealth by (a) establishing disease-testing requirements that animals must meet if participating in a public gathering or assembled for sale or auction and (b) establish procedures for the disposition of positive reactors.

The effectiveness of the regulation in achieving these goals is reflected, in part, in the freedom from EIA in Virginia. The Commonwealth has minimized the incursion of this disease having a major impact on the horse industry because of the effectiveness of this regulation.

The regulation is clearly written and easily understandable by the individuals and entities affected.

Alternatives

Considered alternatives to this regulation are (1) to set no requirements for the testing of EIA to determine possible exposure to disease and (2) to not require negative test results be presented prior to participating in public gatherings or assembling for sale or auction. The agency rejects these alternatives because, without the testing system, diseased animals would transmit the illness throughout Virginia. The source of these animals would be impossible to determine or remain unknown. The ability of Virginia horsemen to transport and sell horses to and through other states may be severely restricted if Virginia does not actively monitor and eradicate this disease.

Recommendation
