The 2004 General Assembly adopted legislation that transferred the VPDES municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4) storm water permitting responsibility from DEQ to the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR). The program was transferred to DCR on January 30, 2005, and is now in effect. The SWCB VPDES Small MS4 General Permit Regulation has been repealed.

On September 27, 2005, the State Water Control Board repealed the VPDES Small MS4 General Permit Regulation.
