This regulatory action will remove from Section 70 of 2 VAC 5-685, *Regulations Governing Pesticide Applicator Certification Under Authority of Virginia Pesticide Control Act*, the requirement of concurrent certification in the agricultural plant pest control category for the subcategories of (i) fumigation of soil and agricultural products and (ii) chemigation.

On May 23, 2013, the Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services adopted amendments to 2 VAC 5-685 et seq., Regulations Governing Pesticide Applicator Certification Under Authority of Virginia Pesticide Control Act.

Section 3.2-109 of the Code of Virginia (Code) authorizes the Board to adopt regulations in accordance with Title 3.2 of the Code regarding agriculture, animal care, and food.

Section 3.2-3906(4) of the Code authorizes the Board to adopt regulations to establish training, testing, and standards for certification of commercial pesticide applicators.

Purpose

The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS) oversees the testing of individuals who desire to become commercial pesticide applicators. 2 VAC 5-685 et seq., Regulations Governing Pesticide Applicator Certification Under Authority of Virginia Pesticide Control Act, establishes the categories and subcategories in which a commercial pesticide applicator may be certified.

Certification in two subcategories, (i) fumigation of soil and agricultural products and (ii) chemigation, currently requires concurrent certification in the agricultural plant pest control category. This requirement was necessary when each of these subcategories did not have its own separate manual and exam.

Now that a manual and exam for both the fumigation of soil and agricultural products subcategory and the chemigation subcategory have been developed, concurrent certification in the agricultural plant pest control category is no longer necessary.

This regulation assists in ensuring that commercial pesticide applicators have the necessary knowledge to enable them to properly use pesticides. The proper use of pesticides is essential to protect the health, safety, and welfare of citizens.

This rulemaking will remove a now unnecessary regulatory requirement for concurrent certification for two subcategories of commercial pesticide applicators. Representatives from pesticide trade groups, growers, and pesticide educators commented favorably on this proposal. Consequently, as this regulatory action will eliminate an unnecessary requirement, we expect this action to be noncontroversial.

Both of these subcategories now each have a separate exam. As such, individuals conducting fumigation of soil and agricultural products or chemigation will continue to be tested and certified.

This regulatory action will remove from Section 70 of 2 VAC 5-685, *Regulations Governing Pesticide Applicator Certification Under Authority of Virginia Pesticide Control Act*, the requirement of concurrent certification in the agricultural plant pest control category for the subcategories of (i) fumigation of soil and agricultural products and (ii) chemigation.

The primary advantage of this action for businesses and the agency is the elimination of a now unnecessary regulatory requirement for concurrent certification for two subcategories of commercial pesticide applicators.

This regulatory action will remove a now unnecessary regulatory requirement for concurrent certification for two subcategories of commercial pesticide applicators. Both of these subcategories now each have a separate exam. As such, individuals conducting fumigation of soil and agricultural products or chemigation will continue to be tested and certified. However, these individuals will not have to also take the agricultural plant pest control category exam. The elimination of this unnecessary regulatory requirement will benefit those businesses whose employees will no longer need to invest the time necessary to prepare for and take the exam in a type of pesticide application in which they will not engage.

The commercial pesticide applicator certification fee collected by the agency allows an individual to take the core applicator certification exam and the exam for as many categories as the individual chooses during one testing session. The elimination of the concurrent certification requirement will not impact the commercial pesticide applicator certification fees collected by the agency. Additionally, the agency will not incur any expenses related to this regulatory action. No locality will incur any costs associated with this regulatory action.

Commercial pesticide applicators certified in the fumigation subcategory, commercial pesticide applicators certified in the chemigation subcategory, and the businesses that employ these applicators will benefit from this regulatory action.

Currently, 74 applicators are certified in the fumigation subcategory and 35 applicators are certified in the chemigation subcategory. Approximately 32 businesses will be affected by this regulatory action. The agency estimates that all of these 32 businesses are small businesses.
