Bear populations have declined across northern and western portions of the state while they have increased across eastern and southern portions. These regulations amendments would eliminate the early 3-day firearms season in 26 northern and western counties where bear populations have declined and increase the general firearms season from 3-weeks to 5-weeks for 35 counties in southern and eastern Virginia where populations have been increasing.

Mandate and Impetus

The impetus for this regulatory amendment is the Board’s biennial periodic review of its hunting, trapping, and wildlife-related regulations. Internal staff review, wildlife management and recreation goals, and consideration of public input through the Board’s regulation review and amendment process deemed these amendments advisable.
