## INVITATION TO COMMENT ON THE NEED TO REGULATE EMERGING PROFESSIONS

## Perfusionists

Virginia Statute authorizes the Virginia Board of Health Professions to advise the Governor, the General Assembly, and Department of Health Professions' Director on matters related to the regulation or deregulation of health care professions and occupations (see §54.1-2510 of the *Code of Virginia*). In its efforts to keep abreast of new and developing health care occupations, the Board has instituted an ongoing review of emerging professions.

At its February 14, 2012 meeting, the Board received a request to conduct a sunrise review of perfusionists and the Board decided to pursue the review at its May 8, 2012 meeting. The Board is now seeking input, information and comment from the public regarding the need to regulate perfusionists in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Attached to this invitation (by reference) are a draft summary of research to date, the initial Sunrise proposal from the Virginia Perfusion Society and Board of Health professions Guidance Document 75-2: Appropriate Criteria in Determining the Need for Regulation of Any Health Care Occupation or Professions. Persons providing comment may benefit by reviewing these documents. They are available on the Board of health Professions website (http://www.dhp.virginia.gov/bhp/). The Board will be reviewing information for each group responsive to the standard evaluative criteria used to assess the need to regulate any health care occupation or professions in Virginia (i.e. "the Criteria"):

- (1) The risk of harm posed by the unregulated practice of the profession must be identifiable;
- (2) Specialized skills and training are needed which require assurance of initial and continued competency;
- (3) Autonomous practice exists for the profession which requires independent judgment and functioning:
- (4) The scope of practice is distinguishable from other regulated professions, despite possible overlapping professional duties, methods of examination, instrumentation, or therapeutic modality;
- (5) The economic cost to the public of restricting the supply of practitioners and cost of board and agency operations to regulate the profession are outweighed by the benefit to the public;
- (6) There are no alternatives to regulation which adequately protect the public; and
- (7) If regulations are required, the least burdensome level of regulation which will protect the public will be recommended.
