No comments were received during the public comment period following the publication of the Notice of Periodic Review. The regulations meet the criteria set out in Executive Order 17 (2014) and are necessary for governing the use of funds under the state’s largest financial aid program, the Virginia Student Financial Assistance Program, as authorized by the Act of Appropriation section 4-5.01b, Student Financial Assistance for Higher Education, and § 23.1-636 et seq of the Code of Virginia. The regulations were last amended in February 2017. Changes reflected in the adopted regulations provide needed clarity and guidance for colleges and universities in the administration of the program. These changes include updated and expanded terminology to ensure uniform administration of the program, incorporating changes to the authorizing laws, and providing administrative guidance
