The Board proposes amending regulations to reflect the Board's approval of the position statement of the American Veterinary Medical Association on terminology for veterinary nurse as a veterinary technician. The proposed regulations amend the licensure requirements for veterinary technicians to accept a degree from an accredited program in veterinary technology that results in a degree in "veterinary nursing." The proposed regulations for licensure by endorsement are also amended to accept the credential of a person who has been practicing in another jurisdiction as a veterinary nurse. In Virginia, the Board will continue to license applicants as veterinary technician as that is the title recognized in the Code of Virginia.

On March 11, 2021, the Board of Veterinary Medicine proposed amending 18VAC150-20-115 and 18VAC150-20-121, Regulations Governing the Practice of Veterinary Medicine.

The Board has decided to amend its regulations to recognize the veterinary "nurse" degree for licensure by examination and the use of the title "veterinary nurse" for licensure by endorsement for applicants seeking licensure as veterinary technicians in Virginia.

The rulemaking is concurring with the American Veterinary Medical Association in accepting veterinary nurse designations as the same as veterinary technician designations. The action does not change the term "veterinary technician" nor does it affect veterinary technology programs in the Commonwealth. Since the intent is to expand access and availability to the profession and since the scope of practice is not affected, it is not expected to be controversial.

Regulations are promulgated under the general authority of Chapter 24 of Title 54.1 of the Code of Virginia. Section 54.1-2400, which provides the Board of Veterinary Medicine the authority to promulgate regulations to administer the regulatory system:

§ 54.1-2400. General powers and duties of health regulatory boards.

The general powers and duties of health regulatory boards shall be:

- 1. To establish the qualifications for registration, certification, licensure or the issuance of a multistate licensure privilege in accordance with the applicable law which are necessary to ensure competence and integrity to engage in the regulated professions.
- 2. To examine or cause to be examined applicants for certification or licensure. Unless otherwise required by law, examinations shall be administered in writing or shall be a demonstration of manual skills.

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- 3. To register, certify, license or issue a multistate licensure privilege to qualified applicants as practitioners of the particular profession or professions regulated by such board.
- 4. To establish schedules for renewals of registration, certification, licensure, and the issuance of a multistate licensure privilege.
- 5. To levy and collect fees for application processing, examination, registration, certification or licensure or the issuance of a multistate licensure privilege and renewal that are sufficient to cover all expenses for the administration and operation of the Department of Health Professions, the Board of Health Professions and the health regulatory boards.
- 6. To promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) that are reasonable and necessary to administer effectively the regulatory system, which shall include provisions for the satisfaction of board-required continuing education for individuals registered, certified, licensed, or issued a multistate licensure privilege by a health regulatory board through delivery of health care services, without compensation, to low-income individuals receiving health services through a local health department or a free clinic organized

in whole or primarily for the delivery of those health services. Such regulations shall not conflict with the purposes and intent of this chapter or of Chapter 1 (\S 54.1-100 et seq.) and Chapter 25 (\S 54.1-2500 et seq.).

The Board of Veterinary Medicine promulgates regulations for veterinary technicians in accordance with section 54.1-3805 of the Virginia Code, which prohibits any person from practicing as a veterinary technician without Board licensure, and section 54.1-3806, which prohibits veterinary technicians from performing certain tasks.

§ 54.1-3805. License required.

No person shall practice veterinary medicine or as a veterinary technician in this Commonwealth unless such person has been licensed by the Board.

...

§ 54.1-3806. Licensed veterinary technicians.

The Board may license a veterinary technician to perform acts relating to the treatment or the maintenance of the health of any animal under the immediate and direct supervision of a person licensed to practice veterinary medicine in the Commonwealth or a veterinarian who is employed by the United States or the Commonwealth while actually engaged in the performance of his official duties. No person licensed as a veterinary technician may perform surgery, diagnose, or prescribe medication for any animal.

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Purpose

The purpose of this regulatory action is to ensure that veterinary "nurse" degree holders are not excluded from licensure as veterinary technicians due solely to their program's terminology. The educational program in veterinary technology and the examination taken by graduates is the same for veterinary technicians or veterinary nurses, so there is no difference in their preparation for practice or their demonstration of competency. Therefore, the health and safety of animals in Virginia would be equally protected in the care of persons with either degree or title.

Substance

The substantive provisions of this regulatory action allow applicants to apply for registration as a veterinary technician with the Board with a college or school transcript designating the words "veterinary nurse/nursing" and to allow applicants to apply for licensure by endorsement with the Board if they have "veterinary nurse" credentials, licensing, or registration from another jurisdiction.

Issues

1) The primary advantage is the removal of any barriers to qualified applicants for licensure as veterinary technicians. Virginia has a shortage of technicians who are vital to veterinary practices, so amendments that remove potential barriers are advantageous to persons who utilize veterinary services. There are no disadvantages to the public.

2) The primary advantage to the Department is continued recognition of qualified persons applying for licensure.

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3) The Board approved the position statement on Veterinary Technician Terminology of the American Veterinary Medical Association, recognizing the use of the term "veterinary nurse" as a "veterinary technician".

The Director of the Department of Health Professions has reviewed the proposal and performed a competitive impact analysis. The Board is authorized under 54.1-2400 to "promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq. which are reasonable and necessary to administer effectively the regulatory system." Any restraint on competition that results from this regulation is in accord with the General Assembly's policy as articulated in § 54.1-100.

The Board has adopted a guidance document (150-27) acknowledging that the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) has stated that it will recognize a veterinary nurse as equivalent to a veterinary technician in its <u>AVMA policy on veterinary technology</u>. Because of this, the Virginia Board of Veterinary Medicine will interpret the requirement for a degree in veterinary technology in 18 VAC 150-20-115(A)(1) and 18 VAC 150-20-121(3) to include a degree in veterinary nursing from an AVMA accredited program.

Since a guidance document is not enforceable and would likely not be read by an applicant looking at requirements for licensure in Virginia, the Board believes it is necessary to amend regulations for licensure by examination and endorsement to clarify its position relative to acceptance of a veterinary nurse degree or credential. The proposed regulation is more inclusive and less intrusive than the current regulation.

Regulatory Flexibility Analysis

There is no regulatory flexibility; Section 54.1-3806 of the Virginia Code grants the Board the authority to promulgate regulations establishing requirements for issuance of a license to practice as a veterinary technician.

Requirements (2) and (3) from this Section add the language "or veterinary nurse" and "or veterinary nursing" to reflect the Board's acknowledgement of veterinary nursing degrees as equivalent to veterinary technology degrees for licensure by endorsement purposes.

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
