The Manufactured Home Safety Regulations set out the safety regulations for manufactured homes and that the Department of Housing and Community Development is delegated authority through HUD (Department of Housing and Urban Development) to regulate the installation of manufactured homes. It also includes provisions for inspections of manufactured home sales lots by the administrator, consumer complaint handling by the administrator, and details the responsibilities of local building officials in approving manufactured home installations. This change is an update to ensure the regulations are consistent with current federal requirements.

This action will also consider amendments to administrative and enforcement provisions of the MHSR as determined necessary for the administration of Virginia's Manufactured Home Installation Program. The addition of specific CFR references in the regulations was a recommendation from HUD to ensure compliance of Virginia's installation program, with federal regulations. This action will ensure that

manufactured homes are installed in a safe manner to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Commonwealth.

The regulatory changes approved at the December 14<sup>th</sup>, 2020 BHCD meeting provide greater clarity to authorities having jurisdiction in enforcing the construction standards of manufactured homes by pointing to the specific federal regulations associated with the design, construction and installation of manufactured homes.
