Section 32.1-325 of the Code of Virginia authorizes the Board of Medical Assistance Services to administer and amend the State Plan for Medical Assistance and to promulgate regulations. Section 32.1-324 of the Code of Virginia authorizes the Director of the Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAS) to administer and amend the State Plan for Medical Assistance and to promulgate regulations according to the

Board's requirements. The Medicaid authority as established by § 1902 (a) of the Social Security Act (42 USC § 1396a) provides governing authority for payments for services.

This periodic review focuses on the DMAS regulations related to the Commonwealth Coordinated Care (CCC) program, which combined certain aspects of Medicaid managed care and long-term care and Medicare into one program.

These regulations are essential because they communicate program requirements to providers; providers must follow these requirements in order to receive reimbursement.

Although the CCC program has ended, these regulations need to stay in place for any pending appeals related to CCC claims. These regulations can be repealed in approximately one year, once any pending appeal is final. There are no viable alternatives for achieving the purpose of the regulations.

DMAS submitted its Notice of Periodic Review to the Town Hall on October 24, 2018. The comment period began on November 26, 2018 and ended on December 18, 2018. No public comments were received.

Effectiveness

The primary advantage of the Commonwealth Coordinated Care Program criteria is to promote person-centered care management for participating Medicaid members. The regulations are necessary for the protection of public health, safety, and welfare in that they govern the CCC program requirements for providers. The regulations are clearly written and easily understandable.

Decision

DMAS is recommending no changes in these regulations as they remain essential and have no negative impact.
