Though 22VAC45-80 protects the public health, safety, and welfare of Virginia's residents who are blind, vision impaired, or deafblind by establishing regulations governing the provision of services in IL rehabilitation services, the regulation is outdated. In practice, DBVI provides IL rehabilitation services as part of its RT services program. DBVI plans to repeal 22VAC45-80.

Decision

DBVI will repeal this regulation and amend 22VAC45-70 (Provision of Services in Rehabilitation Teaching) to include certain provisions specific to the delivery of IL services to individuals who are blind, vision impaired, and deafblind.

The agency has not received any complaints or comments concerning the regulation.

The regulation, which the Department plans to repeal, is not complex; it is easy to read and understand. DBVI last reviewed this regulation on or around 1999 or 2000. The regulation does not conflict with other state or federal regulations though the IL services described in this regulation will be incorporated by DBVI into 22VAC45-70 (Provision of Services in Rehabilitation Teaching) in order to accurately reflect the agency's delivery of RT/IL services. There are no substantial changes in technology, economic conditions, or other factors that impact the importance of implementation of the regulation.

Economic impact on small business generally is negligible because the regulation pertains specifically to the provision of specialized IL services to individuals who are blind, vision impaired, and deafblind. Additionally, members of the small business community have opportunity to make public comment during periodic review and annually as part of DBVI's conduct of public meetings.
