Section 3.2-109 of the Code of Virginia (Code) establishes the Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services (Board) as a policy board with the authority to adopt regulations in accordance with the provisions of Title 3.2 of the Code.

Sections 3.2-6001 and 3.2-6002 of the Code authorize the Board to adopt regulations to protect the livestock and poultry of the Commonwealth against all contagious and infectious diseases and to prevent the spread of or eradicate these diseases.

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Part 86 of Title 9 of the *Code of Federal Regulations* requires that breeding cattle and certain other livestock moving interstate be officially identified and accompanied by an interstate certificate of veterinary inspection or other documentation.

Without this regulation, livestock and poultry across Virginia moving through livestock markets would be more vulnerable to emerging and foreign animal diseases. This regulation is necessary to minimize the effects on Virginia's animal industry from costly diseases. Additionally, this regulation is necessary to ensure required animal disease traceability, which allows the tracing of an animal in the event of a disease diagnosis.
