Under the current regulation, localities can choose to develop a plan independently (local plan) or may choose to plan regionally with other localities (regional plan). In total, 48 water supply plans were submitted in 2008, of which 10 were local plans and 38 were regional plans with the majority of those consisting of one county and one or more cities or incorporated towns located within the boundaries of the county.
