Legal basis

Section 32.1-12 of the Code of Virginia authorizes the Board of Health (Board) to promulgate regulations that are necessary to carry out the provisions of Title 32.1 of the Code of Virginia. Section 32.1-276.4 of the Code of Virginia requires the State Health Commissioner to contract with a nonprofit organization to "collect, compile, and publish Health Employer Data and Information Set (HEDIS) information or reports or other quality of care or performance information sets approved by the Board pursuant to § 32.1-276.5, and submitted by health maintenance organizations or other health care plans."

Section 32.1-276.5 of the Code of Virginia requires that HMOs "shall annually submit to the Commissioner, to make available to consumers who make health benefit enrollment decisions, audited data consistent with the latest version of the Health Employer Data and Information Set (HEDIS), as required by the National Committee for Quality Assurance, or any other quality of care or performance information set as approved by the Board. The Commissioner, at his discretion, may grant a waiver of the HEDIS or other approved quality of care or performance information set upon a determination by the Commissioner that the health maintenance organization has met Board-approved exemption criteria. The Board shall promulgate regulations to implement the provisions of this section." This section also requires that the Commissioner

make available to consumers the HMO data. The Board is required to evaluate biennially the impact and effectiveness of the data collected.

Section 32.1-276.8 of the Code of Virginia grants the Board the authority to prescribe a tiered-fee structure based on the number of enrollees for each health maintenance organization to cover the costs of collecting and making available the data.
